Amending Section 3.103

Executive Summary Amending Chapter Three of Ordinances Specific Speed Limits - CTH H

The CTH H Bridge over Bass Creek is currently being replaced under the Federal Aid Bridge Program administered by the Wisconsin Department of Transportation. During the design phase of this bridge replacement project, it was determined that the current speed zone locations required a design length of the beamguard treatment on the north side of the bridge that would impact access and usability of the parcel to the northwest of the bridge.

By extending the 25 mile per hour (mph) speed zone northerly, the beamguard length could be reduced and the impact to the property northwest of the bridge could be minimized.

With the proposed extension of the 25 mph speed zone, the 45 mph speed zone limits need to be adjusted. The 45 mph speed zone would be located closer to a curve on CTH H at the intersection of Ellis Road. The curve has advanced warning signs indicating it to be a 45 mph curve. This has been verified using the standard ball-bank indicator analysis.

The distance remaining between the adjusted 45 mph speed zone and the curve is approximately 530 feet. Due to the close proximity of the speed zone to the curve, the 45 mph speed zone could be extended just north of the curve.

Executive Summary

Rock County had 33 confirmed deaths due to opioid overdose in 2016, and is on track to exceed that number in 2017. While our community has some outpatient services available for treatment, and has taken steps to bridge gaps in care for uninsured individuals, there is still a shortage of evidence-based treatment for opioid dependence. The best standard of care for treating opioid dependence is a combination of self-help, behavioral therapies, and medications. Currently, individuals seeking medication-assisted treatment face wait times of 3-6 months to receive care, and have additional barriers due to lack of providers and rapid discharges for program violations. With the State Targeted Response (STR) Grant Funds, Rock County Human Services will expand outpatient programming to provide greater access to medication-assisted treatment for individuals in our community. We will offer intensive outpatient AODA services in a comprehensive treatment program that combines monitoring, counseling, case management, and medications. The program will operate on foundational principles of removing barriers to accessing care, reducing wait times, and implementing best practices for treatment. We will use the existing structure of our AODA walk-in clinic to facilitate initial screening and admission and will also use existing facilities and staff through our Janesville Counseling Center to provide psychiatric care. To accommodate the monitoring and case management needs associated with medication-assisted treatment. Rock County Human Services will hire a part time nurse and a full time AODA therapist to provide for patient care and to support psychiatry staff in a multi-disciplinary team format. Throughout the project, Rock County will be receiving technical assistance from The Network for the Improvement of Addiction Treatment (NIATx) at UW Madison, as part of an ongoing project to expand medication-assisted treatment. Our hope is that this addition to our service array will offer greater access to treatment for individuals struggling with opioid addiction in Rock County. Our ultimate goals are to reduce overdose deaths, to help individuals reduce drug use and remain engaged in treatment, to enhance public safety, and to improve quality of life for individuals and families in our community. In addition to salaries and benefits, the STR funds will purchase drug testing, drug treatment, computers and phones. Rock County Human Services intends to apply for a subsequent STR Grant in

2018. Should Rock County not be funded, the Project Positions would be eliminated in April 2018.

Executive Summary

The Yahara River Watershed is threatened by excessive phosphorus from sources identified as agricultural runoff, urban stormwater and wastewater treatment plant discharges. The elevated phosphorus levels are a threat to water quality and aquatic life throughout the Yahara Watershed. The Yahara Watershed Improvement Network (Yahara WINs), began in 2012 to reduce all phosphorus loads and meet water quality standards established by the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (WDNR). This program employs watershed adaptive management, a strategy in which all sources of phosphorus pollution in an area work together to meet water quality goals. This strategy is more effective and less expensive than the sources working separately on individual solutions. Partners in Yahara WINs include cities, villages, towns, wastewater treatment plants, agricultural producers, environmental groups and others.

Yahara WINS approached the Land Conservation Department in 2016 to discuss the merits of developing a partnership to apply best management practices in Rock County's portion of the Yahara River watershed. A Service Agreement was entered into by both parties and the Land Conservation Department's Budget was amended. The information used to amend the LCD budget was based on the best available information.

Since then, staff has been engaged with interested landowners. The requested amendments to the LCD budget are based on estimates generated from these contacts and spatial information gathered from the field.

Yahara WINS will reimburse the County for costs associated with the aforementioned work, on a dollar for dollar basis.

- (1) Official Address and Road Database. The address numbers contained within the Official Address Database (hereafter called the Database) accompanies and is made part of this Ordinance. The Database shall be regularly updated by the Committee Designee and kept on file in the Office of the Planning and Development Agency and 911 Communications Department with a copy on file in the County Clerk's office. The Rock County Planning and Development Agency as well as the 911 Communications Department shall keep the original version of said Database and add all new address numbers, address number changes, new road names, and road name changes as they are established. A "Master Database of Rock County Road Names" shall be an integral part of the Official Address and Road Database.
- (2) Road Names. There is hereby established a uniform system of names for all roads in the unincorporated areas of Rock County, Wisconsin as follows:
 - (A) U.S. and State Trunk Highways, which are presently designated by number by the State Department of Transportation, Division of Highways, shall retain such designation. All U.S. and State Trunk Highways shall be numbered by the State Department of Highways and the sign name shall be N, S, E, or W, U.S. "#", and STH "#" respectively.
 - (B) All County Highways which are presently designated by letter by Rock County shall retain such designation. All new County Highways or change of designation shall be named by the Rock County Board of Supervisors. County Highway sign names shall be N, S, E or W, CTH "#".
 - (C) All other public roads shall be designated by name on the Official Address and Road Map prepared by the Rock County Planning and Development Agency in cooperation with the respective Towns and approved as part of this ordinance shall retain their names as indicated on the map.
- (3) The Planning and Development Committee will confer with the Town Boards in the naming or renaming of roads. New road names crossing the boundary from one town into another, or a new road that is an extension from an existing road shall bear the same name. In Towns that have roads which continue into an adjoining Town, the respective towns in conjunction with the Committee shall mutually agree on the naming or renaming of roads. Failing agreement of the town, the Committee shall notify the respective Town with a 60 day prior notice of the Committee's intent to assign a road name. The Committee shall herein have the authority to establish the Official Road Name after following the above procedure.
- (4) The name of a proposed new road or the renaming of an existing road shall not duplicate, or too closely approximate phonetically, the name of any other road or street name in the County.
- (5) New roads resulting from the approval of new land divisions shall be named in accordance with the Land Division Regulations of Rock County. The road names shall be added to the "Official Address and Road Map" and the Master Index of Rock County Road Names upon final approval of a land division.

242 4.605 Address Signs

(1) General. All buildings and other locations within the unincorporated areas of Rock County, shall have an assigned address number. The assigned address number shall be posted on an address sign unit located as provided by the following specifications:

(A) The sign shall be installed so that the plate is perpendicular to the roadway and not more than three feet from the road right-of-way, and not closer than five (5) feet or further than ten (10) feet from the driveway serving the building.

(B) The sign plate shall be installed not less than four feet and not more than five feet from ground level. The sign unit shall be installed in a clear and unobstructed view from the roadway.

(C) Multi-family dwellings and industrial or business complexes will be assigned individual address numbers as determined by the Committee Designee.

(D) A driveway servicing multiple buildings or acting as a joint driveway for multiple parcels shall have a sign unit indicating the range of individual addresses being served on the driveway. The multiple sign unit shall be placed at the intersection of the driveway and the public road. Individual address signs shall also be placed at each building or location on the driveway.

(E) Additional address signs may be located on a building. Any second number sign erected on a building shall not be in place of the primary sign unit required by this ordinance.

(2) Address Sign Specifications

(A) The address sign unit shall consist of a Flag Style sign plate (on which the address numbers, town name, and road name are enumerated on both sides) mounted on a sign post with associated hardware. The sign plate, post, and hardware shall meet the minimum specifications of this ordinance.

(B) The Address sign unit shall have a red background with white letters and border. All signs shall be on 3M high Intensity Prismatic sheeting 3930 utilizing 3M ink with clear anti-graffiti/UV-stabilizer film applied over finished sign. The address number shall be four (4) inches high: series B or C numbers (which will be a maximum of 5 (5) integers long) located in the appropriate center of the sign. Based on National Manual for Traffic Control Signs.

(C) Sign Plates shall be manufactured of flat sheet aluminum, at a minimum thickness gauge of 0.080 of an inch with 3/4 inch radius curved corners. There shall be two (2) 3/8 inch holes in the attachment side of the sign a minimum of one (1) inch from top, bottom and edge.

(D) Sign Plates shall be at least eight (8) inches in height and twenty (20) inches in width or longer depending on length of number, town name, and/or road name.

(E) Sign Posts shall be seven foot "U" channel steel posts, with a minimum weight of 1.12 pounds per linear foot. A minimum of 2 holes shall be contained in each post with diameters of 3/8 to 1/2 inches beginning at the center one inch from the top of the post and the second hole located in direct alignment with the bottom hole on the sign plate. Sign posts shall be finished with a deep-green enamel.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY ROCK COUNTY ADDRESS ORDINANCE REVISION

The Rock County Board, via the "Rock County Address Ordinance" manages 16,661 addresses within the unincorporated areas of the County (outside of Cities & Villages). Originally adopted in 1994, the "Rock County Address Ordinance" establishes and maintains a consistent rural address number and road name system. Each location is assigned a unique address which will aid emergency personnel in providing fire protection, emergency medical services, police services, civil defense, and delivery of mail and meet other general location needs of the public.

Various County Departments (i.e. 911 Communication, Planning & Development Agency, Real Property Lister and County Clerk) and Town Officials (representing unincorporated areas), which actively use and manage this addressing system, deemed it necessary to amend the current Ordinance to incorporate new and improved address sign specifications. Older signs installed in 1994 were one sided facing parallel to the road. The amendment will require two sided signs placed perpendicular to the roadway to facilitate ease of recognition. The new signs incorporate 3M High Intensity Prismatic sheeting with clear anti-graffiti/UV-stabilizer film applied over the finished sign.

The building does not meet the current International Building Codes or the Life Safety Codes. This building will have to be brought up to the current codes if it were to be occupied again. There was a cost analysis completed in 2012 to consider renovation of this building for our new nursing home and it showed it was more cost effective to build new. We again conducted a cost analysis in 2017 to consider renovating this building for office space and again it showed it would be more cost effective to build new. Therefore we are recommending \$1,000,000 in funds be budgeted in 2018 for the demolition of this building to take place in 2018.
