1. **Call to Order:** Chair Bostwick called the meeting to order at 7:04 pm.  
  
**Committee Members Present:** Stephanie Aegerter, Rich Bostwick, Wes Davis, Brenton Driscoll, Alan Sweeney, James Quade, and Jeremy Zajac  
  
**Committee Members Excused:** James Quade and Robert Potter  
  
**Others Present:** Tom Sweeney, LCD; Anne Miller, LCD
2. **Approval of Agenda:** Supervisor Davis moved to approve the agenda as presented, seconded by Supervisor Zajac. **Motion Carried.**
3. **Approval of Minutes – July 3, 2019:** Supervisor Driscoll moved the minutes from the July 3, 2019 LCC meeting as presented, seconded by Supervisor Aegerter. **Motion Carried.**
4. **Citizen Participation, Communications, and Announcements:** Tom Sweeney noted the Southern Area Association Summer Tour will be held on August 20<sup>th</sup> by Green County. If any Supervisor is interested, please inform to ASAP.
5. **Review Bills Paid:** The committee reviewed the bills paid. Supervisor Davis asked for verification on two bills. Hendrickson – Clerk Desk and Staples for office supplies and new clerk chair.
6. **Land and Water Resource Management Program -**
  - a. **Approve Cost Share Agreements.** Supervisor Zajac moved to approve the agreements as presented, seconded by Supervisor Davis. Tom Sweeney reviewed the agreements for Brett Arnold and James Erickson. **Motion Carried.**
  - b. **Land and Water Resource Management Plan Update.** Tom Sweeney updated the committee on the LWRM Plan update. Tom distributed copies of the final working draft and noted that water quality information on the main stem of the Rock River maybe added. DNR needs to forward to the LCD. The LCC will consider advancing the final working draft to DATCP and DNR during their September 4, 2019 meeting. If you have comments on the working draft, please contact Tom or Anne.
7. **Yahara WINs Program – Approval of Cost Share Agreements:** Supervisor Zajac moved to approve the cost share agreements as presented, seconded by Supervisor Driscoll. Tom Sweeney presented the agreements for the Nelson Family, Ryan Nelson (2) Evan Sayre, Sweeney Farms, and Thomas Young. At this time Supervisor Sweeney told Chair Bostwick he would be abstaining from the vote. **Motion Carried.**

8. **Construction Site Erosion Control/Storm Water Management - Permit Extension Requests:** Supervisor Zajac moved to approve the extension requests as presented, seconded by Supervisor Driscoll. Tom Sweeney noted that the Town of Union and Zach Knutson permits have or will expire soon and final work needs to be completed on both sites. Delays are due to weather. **Motion Carried.**
9. **Approval of Application for USDA-NRCS Staffing Grant:** Supervisor Zajac moved to approve the application for the USDA-NRCS Staffing Grant, seconded by Supervisor Driscoll. Tom Sweeney noted the approval request was for the amended application. Tom Sweeney continued stating that a 3 year staffing grant was awarded to the LCD, the amendment adds an additional funding year with an option for a fifth funding year. **Motion Carried.**
10. **Clean Sweep Funding Allocation – ATC Funds:** Supervisor Sweeney moved to approve the Clean Sweep Funding Allocation, seconded by Supervisor Davis. Anne Miller presented background information on the Clean Sweep Program and asked the committee to allocate \$50,000 of funding from the recent ATC Environmental Impact deposit. Supervisor Sweeney asked Anne Miller what the chances were to develop formal MOUs with all the Municipalities in the County to assure future funding, noting the ATC fund is finite. Miller stated the Clean Sweep workgroup will be convening in the near future and this will be an agenda item. A long discussion followed regarding MOUs with all partners. Supervisor Sweeney amended the motion to allocate one year funding, not to exceed \$25,000 and develop MOUs with partners, seconded by Supervisor Aegerter. Chair Bostwick noted the vote will be for the amendment. **Motion Carried.** Chair Bostwick noted the vote will be for the amended motion. **Motion Carried.**
11. **Groundwater Nitrate Workgroup - Update:** Tom Sweeney noted the next Groundwater Workgroup meeting will be held on September 16, 2019 at the LCC Conference Room. Also, on August 19, 2019 Wisconsin Counties Association (WCA) will be in Rock County to produce a video on Groundwater Issues the County is facing. This Video will be available during the WCA Conference.
11. **Purchase of Agricultural Conservation Easements - Update:** Tom Sweeney updated the committee on activities associated with the PACE program, noting an MOU with NRCS for funding the Barlass easements will need approval and the application period for 2019 closes on August 31, 2019.
12. **Adjourn:** Supervisor Aegerter moved to adjourn the August 7, 2019 Land Conservation Committee meeting at 8:47 pm, seconded by Supervisor Davis. **Motion Carried.**

**Yahara River Basin Adaptive Management Project**  
**Approval of Incentive Payments**

- 1 **WHEREAS**, Yahara Watershed Improvement Network (Yahara WINS) approached the Land  
2 Conservation Department (LCD) in 2016 to discuss the merits of developing a partnership for the  
3 Adaptive Management Program for Rock County's portion of the Yahara River Watershed; and,  
4  
5 **WHEREAS**, Adaptive Management Projects allows municipalities to implement phosphorus reducing  
6 projects within the watershed in lieu of making very expensive upgrades to their wastewater treatment  
7 facilities while meeting water quality goals for phosphorus. The most cost effective projects for  
8 phosphorus reduction can be found in the implementation of best management practices within the  
9 agricultural sector; and,  
10  
11 **WHEREAS**, through many discussions with Yahara WINS management and Land Conservation  
12 Department (LCD) staff a service agreement was developed, outlining all requirements for the  
13 programs goals and expectations for both parties, more specifically the agreement requires Yahara  
14 WINS to reimburse Rock County for all costs associated with the implementation of phosphorus runoff  
15 abatement best management practices and associated costs for staff and support for said project on a  
16 dollar for dollar basis; and,  
17  
18 **WHEREAS**, the Service Agreement was entered into by the Land Conservation Committee (LCC) and  
19 Yahara WINS in early 2017, which allowed the LCD to commence with the implementation phase of the  
20 Adaptive Management Project in Rock County's portion of the Yahara River Watershed; and,  
21  
22 **WHEREAS**, since early 2017, LCD staff has engaged landowners who expressed interest in program  
23 participation, which has resulted in best management practice installation agreements to be initiated by  
24 the land owners and the LCC; and,  
25  
26 **WHEREAS**, in some instances the BMP costs will exceed the Rock County's financial thresholds of  
27 \$25,000 which require additional approvals by the Finance Committee and County Board of Supervisors;  
28 and,  
29  
30 **WHEREAS**, the Rock County Best Management Practice Installation Agreement WINS-03.19 will  
31 exceed the aforesaid thresholds to provide funding for the establishment of a water quality harvestable  
32 buffer system in the Yahara River Watershed. The mentioned agreement is based on an incentive  
33 payment which requires the landowner to operate and maintain the BMP system for a period of fifteen  
34 years.  
35  
36 **NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED** that the Rock County Board of Supervisors duly assembled  
37 this \_\_\_\_\_ day of \_\_\_\_\_, 2019, approves the incentive payments for Rock County Best  
38 Management Practice Installation Agreements WINS 03.19 in the sum of \$27,507.50.



### **Executive Summary**

The Yahara River Watershed is threatened by excessive phosphorus from sources identified as agricultural runoff, urban storm water and wastewater treatment plant discharges. The elevated phosphorus levels are a threat to water quality and aquatic life throughout the Yahara Watershed. The Yahara Watershed Improvement Network (Yahara WINS), began in 2012 to reduce all phosphorus loads and meet water quality standards established by the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (WDNR). This program employs watershed adaptive management, a strategy in which all producers of phosphorus pollution, point and non-point sources, in the Yahara watershed basin work together to meet water quality goals. This strategy is more effective and less expensive than the sources working separately on individual solutions. Partners in Yahara WINS include cities, villages, towns, wastewater treatment plants, agricultural producers, environmental groups and others.

Yahara WINS approached the Land Conservation Department in 2016 to discuss the merits of developing a partnership to apply best management practices in Rock County's portion of the Yahara River watershed. A Service Agreement was entered into by both parties and the Land Conservation Department's Budget was amended to facilitate the cost share and/or incentive agreements.

Since then, staff has been engaged with various landowners whom expressed interest in the overall programs goals. Numerous agreements have been signed by landowners who have implemented best management practices. Knowing a few agreements would exceed the financial threshold of \$25,000 established by County Board rules, requiring actions by both the Finance Committee and County Board of Supervisors. Rock County Best Management Practice Installation Agreement WINS-03.19 exceed the established threshold and requires approval from County Board.

Yahara WINS reimburses the County for costs associated with the aforementioned work, on a dollar for dollar basis.

**ACCEPTING THE USDA-NRCS STAFFING GRANT AND  
AMENDING THE 2019 LAND CONSERVATION DEPARTMENT BUDGET  
TO ADD A NEW 1.0 FTE SENIOR CONSERVATION SPECIALIST POSITION**

1 **WHEREAS**, the Land Conservation Department (LCD) made an staffing grant application to the USDA-  
2 Natural Resource Conservation Service (NRCS) in early 2019; and,  
3

4 **WHEREAS**, the grant application identified three priorities that are currently out of reach with the  
5 current LCD staff and associated workload, those being: Improve surface and groundwater quality in  
6 targeted watersheds through the development of Nine Key Element (9KE) Plans, implement BMP's in  
7 select watershed to reduce runoff/infiltration impacts to surface and groundwater resources, provide  
8 assistance to UWEX for the formation and fostering of Producer-Led Watershed Groups, and provide  
9 technical assistance to NRCS to reduce the current backlog in the Environmental Quality Incentive  
10 Program (EQIP); and,  
11

12 **WHEREAS**, the NRCS has confirmed that the LCD has been awarded the staffing grant in the sum of  
13 \$380,000 over a span of four years, with a fifth year funding option, to commence on September 30, 2019  
14 and with a completion date of September, 30 2024; and,  
15

16 **WHEREAS**, the LCD will commence with the development of 9KE Plans, for selected hydrologic unit  
17 code (HUC10) watersheds in Rock County. The plans require comprehensive land use inventories,  
18 running complex hydrologic models, identifying specific water quality areas needing treatment, the  
19 development of a schedule of technical and financial needs, and establishment of a monitoring component  
20 for the watershed being studied; and,  
21

22 **WHEREAS**, the LCD shall complete the 9KE plans in a timely manner. The completed/approved plans  
23 are a requirement for water quality program implementation grant from the WDNR and NRCS, which the  
24 LCD intends to make application for in the future; and,  
25

26 **WHEREAS**, the LCD will provide assistance to UWEX for the development of Producer-Led  
27 Watershed Groups in selected watersheds. The groups are part of the solution to improve soil and water  
28 resource quality by encouraging conservation decision making and developing solutions at the users'  
29 level. This activity leads to additional funding opportunities for the implementation of BMPs in select  
30 watersheds; and,  
31

32 **WHEREAS**, the NRCS is experiencing a large workload backlog (70) in the following three programs:  
33 CRP, CSP, and EQIP and as part of the grant LCD will provide technical assistance to the NRCS to  
34 reduce the aforesaid backlog.  
35

36 **NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED** that the Rock County Board of Supervisors duly assembled





## EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The Land Conservation Department made a staffing grant application to the USDA-Natural Resource Conservation Service (NRCS) in the spring of 2019 to begin efforts that address the high nitrates being found in the County's groundwater and develop a more concentrated effort that addresses the surface water quality issues. The NRCS notified the LCD in late June 2019 that Rock County's application will receive the grant. NRCS staff stated that four years of funding is currently available and an option to fund the fifth year is included in the grant. If funding is made available in the future, the LCD and NRCS will amend the award to include the fifth year option.

As part of the grant application, the LCD identified three priorities: Improve surface and groundwater quality in targeted watersheds through the development of Nine Key Element (9KE) Plans, implement Best Management Practices (BMP) in targeted watersheds to reduce runoff/nitrate infiltration impacts to surface and groundwater resources, provide assistance to UWEX for the formation and fostering of Producer-Led Watershed Groups, and provide technical assistance to NRCS to reduce the current backlog (70) of best management practices in the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP), the Conservation Stewardship Program (CSP) and the Environmental Quality Incentive Program (EQIP).

The LCD highlighted the need to develop and gain WDNR approval for 9KE Plans for targeted watersheds, as identified by the Groundwater Nitrate Workgroup. The current workload in the LCD prohibits the development of these plans. If approved, the new staff member's primary responsibility will be the development of the aforesaid plans and seek WDNR's approval. Once the plans are approved by the DNR, they will become an integral part of water quality management implementation grant applications, which in turn leads to funding for BMP implementation. Currently, water quality management granting agencies (WDNR and NRCS) require 9KE plans to be considered for implementation funding.

The 9KE plans include comprehensive land use/farming practice inventories, results from running hydrologic models that identify specific water quality areas needing additional treatment for the water resource under consideration, the development of a schedule of technical and financial needs, and establishment of a monitoring component for the targeted watersheds.

The LCD will also assist UWEX with the development of Producer-Led Watershed Groups in the selected/targeted watersheds. These groups are now considered an integral part of the solution to improve soil and water resource quality by encouraging conservation decision making and developing solutions at the users' level. This activity leads to additional funding opportunities for the implementation of BMPs in selected watersheds.

And finally the last priority addresses the current backlog in the NRCS funded aforesaid programs. These programs provide producers incentives (cost sharing) to implement and maintain BMPs that reduce or eliminate impacts to water quality. Currently the NRCS has a back log of 70 specific funded BMPs.
