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## SUPPORT OF CLEAN ENERGY CHOICE FOR WISCONSIN

WHEREAS, Rock County has pursued the goal of becoming more sustainable in its planning, operations, management, and policymaking by implementing numerous projects, initiatives, and policies that save energy, reduce waste and conserve natural resources while supporting a healthy economy; and,

WHEREAS, such recent County initiatives include using a geo thermal heating system at the new Rock Haven facility which will save the County \$147,000 per year and pay back the cost of the system within 6 years; and,

WHEREAS, Clean Energy Choice will expand market opportunities for Rock County and Wisconsin companies and their employees who are part of the state's vast renewable energy supply chain by integrating locally available renewable energy into our economy and by engaging local manufacturers, distributors, farmers, builders, entrepreneurs, and related professional workers; and,

WHEREAS, Rock County urges the State of Wisconsin to adopt a policy expressly allowing customers to enter into contracts with third parties who install, own, and operate a renewable energy system at the customer's premises by supporting Clean Energy Choice, which will help households and businesses overcome the diminishing supply of renewable energy incentive dollars available from Wisconsin's Focus on Energy program and utilities at no extra cost to ratepayers and taxpayers; and,

WHEREAS, current ambiguities in state law make it difficult for customers to access directly clean renewable energy produced on their premises from systems owned by third parties, and more than 22 states have adopted policies expressly authorizing these types of arrangements with third parties; and,

WHEREAS, the businesses, residents, schools and local governments in Rock County desire to exercise responsibility over their long-term energy choices and integrate clean energy into their daily lives.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Rock County Board of Supervisors in session this 10 day of October, 2013, that the Rock County Board joins the other Wisconsin citizens, businesses, and local governments to endorse Clean Energy Choice as a policy for Wisconsin residents.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Rock County Board of Supervisors directs the County
Clerk to send a copy of this resolution to the County's state legislative delegation.

## Wisconsin Needs to Approve Clean Energy Choice

The current ambiguities in Wisconsin public utility law interfere with customers' ability to access clean energy produced on their premises. In states where leased solar for electricity is specifically allowed, such as Arizona and Colorado, such arrangements have accounted for up to 90 percent of new installations, according to the Solar Energy Industries Association. Such arrangements allow people who don't have several thousand dollars on hand for up-front equipment purchase to have an accessible free market choice about how they obtain electricity. If they want a solar PV system, they can host one without being legally required to spend thousands initially.

But here in Wisconsin, we have a problem. A big utility took legal action in the neighboring state of Iowa to stop Dubuque from buying solar power directly from a company that would own and manage panels on city buildings. And the risk of protracted, expensive legal challenges from utilities so far has deterred third-party solar companies from trying to do business in Wisconsin.

The effect of this ambiguity in Wisconsin is to restrict property rights and citizens' freedom of choice. What is needed is a policy that clarifies one's right to purchase renewable energy produced by equipment located on their premises. To achieve this objective, we are working on a grassroots effort, which we call *Clean Energy Choice*, to embed in state law a citizen's right to access clean energy produced on his or her premises.

- The *Clean Energy Choice* policy would affirm customers' right to decide how they wish to purchase, lease, or implement a renewable energy system for their site.
- Because Clean Energy Choice allows third parties to provide the needed up-front capital
  with a leasing arrangement, this policy will greatly expand the number of energy users
  who can afford to host solar, wind, or biogas systems serving their homes or businesses.
  This provides a free choice alternative to the monopoly service that big electric utilities
  presently provide.
- Clean Energy Choice would help households and businesses overcome the diminishing supply of renewable energy incentive dollars available from Wisconsin's Focus on Energy program and utilities at no extra cost to rate payers and taxpayers.
- In contract to standard utility electric service, obtaining directly from a renewable energy system can enable households and businesses to lock in predetermined prices for 10 years or longer. The price of energy from a third-party owed renewable energy system does not increase or decrease as a result of short-term fluctuations in the cost of conventional fossil fuels. This provides a free market choice.
- Electricity from a third party-owned system usually flows to the customer directly, offsetting consumption, or it is sold to the utility under an approved tariff. The rate impact from such installations would be negligible.
- Clean Energy Choice will greatly expand market opportunities for Wisconsin companies and their employees who are part of the state's renewable energy supply chain. For example, there are an estimated 135 companies in Wisconsin participating in the solar market, including Helios, Ingeteam, and Caleffi, three Milwaukee-based manufacturers.

This resolution encourages the state legislature to adopt a Clean Energy Choice program for Wisconsin.
