11.E. Modifying the Rock County COVID-19 Emergency Small Business Loan Fund Resolution No. 20-12A-144

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, the Rock County Board of Supervisors, duly assembled this 17th day of December, 2020, authorizes and approves the modification of the Rock County COVID-19 Emergency Small Business Loan Fund (SBLF) into four different, yet related, program allocations. In addition to preserving and servicing the original SBLF [Fund I], a new micro-loan offering will be dedicated toward meeting the needs of: minority-owned small businesses [Fund II]; home-based businesses that represent new start-ups and/or early stage firms [Fund III]; and non-profits that provide cultural, social, or tourism-related assistance [Fund IV]. These reallocated or reprogrammed monies for Fund II, Fund III and Fund IV will be equal and in the amount of \$225,000 per Fund. The remaining SBLF balance will be for Fund I. BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that overall SBLF program oversight, policy and funding decision making authority remains granted to the appointed seven-member Rock County COVID-19 Emergency Small Business Loan Fund Committee (LFC). Additionally, the County Board Chair is authorized to appoint a five-member subcommittee, at least two of which are to be members of the LFC and at least three of which are to be County Board members, to make funding and policy recommendations to the LFC regarding Funds II - Fund IV. Subcommittee appointments will be for a period of time deemed necessary to address, respond, or recover from the impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the County Board continues to delegate the administrative, fiscal and program management of this modified Rock County COVID-19 SBLF to the County's Planning, Economic and Community Development Department.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED the LFC is empowered to direct and approve expenditures from the existing SBLF Administrative Fund; and at its discretion, direct staff to develop third-party agreements to administer and/or provide services, as needed, on the County's behalf. Supervisors Yeomans and Gustina moved the above resolution. ADOPTED by acclamation.

11.F. Definitions

Eligible Employees: For the purposes of taking leave under the Emergency Family Leave pursuant to this Resolution, 'eligible employees' are employees who have been employed by the County for at least 30 calendar days. Consistent with prior decision made by the County pursuant to section 3105 of the Families First Coronavirus Response Act the County, the County continues to exclude health care providers and first responders as eligible employees.

Child Care Provider: the term 'child care provider' means a provider who receives compensation for providing child care services on a regular basis.

First Responder: The term 'first responder' means any employee who works for the following departments: Rock County Communications Center (911), Rock County Medical Examiner's Office, or the Rock County Youth Services Center. 'First responder' also includes the following personnel the Rock County Sheriff's Office: Employees who are members of the collective bargaining units represented by the Correctional Officers Association, the Deputy Sheriffs Association, and the Deputy Sheriff Supervisors Association; all employees in the Emergency Management Bureau; the Chief Deputy; and all employees holding the rank of commander or captain.

Health Care Provider: The term 'health care provider' means any employee who works for the following departments: Rock Haven Nursing Home, and Rock County Public Health Department.

Public Health Emergency: The term 'public health emergency' means an emergency with respect to COVID-19 declared by a Federal, State, or local authority.

Qualifying Need Related to a Public Health Emergency: The term 'qualifying need related to a Public health emergency' means the employee is unable to work (or telework) due to a need for leave to care for their son or daughter under 18 years of age of the employee because the employee's son or daughter's school or place of care has closed, or the child care provider of the employee's son or daughter is unavailable due to a public health emergency.

School: the term 'school' means an elementary school or secondary school as such terms are defined in section 1801 of the Elementary School and Secondary Education Act of 1965 (20 U.S.C. § 7801).

Temporary COVID Related Paid Sick Leave

Generally

In addition to the sick leave provided under Section 18.515 of the Rock County Code of Ordinances, all employees, except as provided below, immediately upon the start of employment shall be provided Temporary COVID Related Paid Sick Leave under this Resolution. Temporary COVID Related Paid Sick Leave may be used by an employee under this Resolution to the extent that the employee is unable to work (or telework) due to a need for leave because:

- (1) The employee is subject to a Federal, State, or local quarantine or isolation order related to COVID-19;
- (2) The employee has been advised by a health care provider to self-quarantine due to concerns related to COVID-19;
- (3) The employee is experiencing symptoms of COVID-19 and seeking medical diagnosis;
- (4) The employee is caring for an individual who is subject to an order as described in subparagraph (1) or has been advised as described in subparagraph (2); or
- (5) The employee is caring for a son or daughter of the employee, if the son or daughter's school or place of care has been closed, or the child care provider of the employee's son or daughter is unavailable, due to COVID-19 precautions.

For the purposes this Resolution, health care providers and first responders are only considered eligible employees for the purposes of taking Temporary COVID Related Paid Sick Leave under subparagraphs (1), (2), (3), & (4). The terms 'health care provider' and 'first responder' shall have the same meaning as those terms are defined under the definitions section of this Resolution above

Hours of Leave Available and Compensation

An employee shall be entitled to Temporary COVID Related Paid Sick Leave in the amount of 80 hours for 1.0 FTE employees and, for less than 1.0 FTE employees, a number of hours equal to the number of hours that such employee works, on average, over a 2-week period. In the case of an employee whose schedule varies from week to week to such an extent that the County is unable to determine with certainty the number of hours the employee would have worked during a standard pay period if such employee had not taken leave under the Temporary COVID Related Paid Sick Leave pursuant to this Resolution, compensation shall be calculated as follows:

- (6) A number of hours in a standard pay period equal to the number of hours that the employee was scheduled per day over the 6-month period ending on the date on which the employee takes Temporary COVID Related Paid Sick Leave, including hours for which the employee took any type of leave; or
- (7) If the employee did not work for a 6-month period, the reasonable expectation of the employee at the time of hiring of the average number of hours per day during a standard pay period that the employee would normally be scheduled to work.

If Temporary COVID Related Paid Sick Leave is used in accordance with subparagraphs (1), (2), or (3) of this Resolution, then the employee's pay during such leave shall be paid at the employee's regular rate of pay except that such payment shall be limited to \$511 per day and \$5,110 in the aggregate. If Temporary COVID Related Paid Sick Leave is used in accordance with subparagraphs (4), or (5) of this Resolution, then the employee's pay during such leave shall be paid at two thirds of the employees regular rate of pay, except that such payment shall be limited to \$200 per day and \$2,000 in the aggregate.

Employees may, at their election, supplement their Temporary COVID Related Paid Sick Leave with the use of any accrued paid leave to which the employee may otherwise be eligible to take under the Rock County Personnel Ordinance, or the Administrative Policy and Procedure Manual to increase their compensation to an amount equal to the compensation the employee would have received if such employee had not used Temporary COVID Related Paid Sick Leave.

Order of Use and Carry Over

Temporary COVID Related Paid Sick Leave under this Resolution shall not carry over from 1 year to the next and shall not be eligible for pay-out under section 18.515 of the Rock County Code of Ordinances.

Temporary COVID Related Paid Sick Leave provided to employees under this Resolution shall cease beginning with the employee's next scheduled work shift immediately following the termination of the need for paid sick leave under subparagraphs (1)-(5) above. Upon cessation of Temporary COVID Paid Sick Leave, the employee must return to work, or if qualified, use other available paid or unpaid benefit time under the Rock County Personnel Ordinance or the Administrative Policy and Procedure Manual.

COVID Related Family Leave

Generally

Eligible employees are entitled to take COVID Related Family Leave because of a qualifying need related to a public health emergency. Such leave shall be taken in the same manner leave provided under the Family Medical Leave Act in accordance with Policy 5.12 of the Administrative Policy and Procedure Manual, except as provided under this Resolution. Leave under this Resolution shall be in addition to any leave available under Policy 5.12.

Relationship to Paid Leave:

The first 10 days for which an employee takes leave because of a qualifying need related to a public health emergency shall be unpaid. An employee may elect to substitute any accrued paid leave to which the employee may otherwise be eligible to take under the Rock County Personnel Ordinance, or the Administrative Policy and Procedure Manual for unpaid leave.

After taking leave because of a qualifying need related to a public health emergency under this Resolution for 10 days, the employee shall be paid as follows:

- (1) An amount that is equal to two-thirds of the employee's regular rate of pay; and
- (2) For the number of hours the employee would otherwise be normally scheduled to work during a standard pay period (or the number of hours calculated for a varying schedule employee below).
- (3) Capped at \$200 per day and a maximum of \$10,000 in the aggregate.

In the case of an employee whose schedule varies from week to week to such an extent that the County is unable to determine with certainty the number of hours the employee would have worked during a standard pay period if such employee had not taken leave under this policy, compensation shall be calculated as follows:

- (4) A number of hours in a standard pay period equal to the number of hours that the employee was scheduled per day over the 6-month period ending on the date on which the employee takes leave under this policy, including hours for which the employee took any type of leave; or
- (5) If the employee did not work for a 6-month period, the reasonable expectation of the employee at the time of hiring of the average number of hours per day during a standard pay period that the employee would normally be scheduled to work.

Employees may supplement paid leave under this policy with accrued paid leave to which the employee may otherwise be eligible to take under the Rock County Personnel Ordinance or Administrative Policy and Procedure Manual to make up any difference in pay based upon the number of hours the employee would otherwise be normally scheduled to work as provided above.

Return to Work After Leave

Employees returning to work after a period of leave under this policy shall return in accordance with the provisions set forth in Policy 5.12 of the Administrative Policy and Procedure Manual.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that any leave program established by this Resolution shall expire upon a determination made by the County Board Staff Committee that a leave program has been established by an act or regulation of the State of Wisconsin or Federal Government which would adequately substitute any leave program created pursuant to this Resolution such that employees would not be substantially disadvantaged by the discontinuance and replacement of the leave programs established by resolution, or upon October 1, 2021, whichever comes first, and upon such expiration all unused leave balances under this resolution shall extinguish. Supervisors Yeomans and Potter moved the above resolution, ADOPTED acclamation,

48 4.1307 REMEDIES NOT EXCLUSIVE

The remedies listed in this ordinance are not exclusive of any other remedies available under any applicable federal, state or local law and it is within the discretion of the LCD to seek cumulative remedies.

4.1308 ULTIMATE RESPONSIBILITY

52 The standards set forth herein and promulgated pursuant to this ordinance are minimum standards; therefore this ordinance does not intend nor imply that compliance by any person will ensure that there will be no contamination, 53 pollution, nor unauthorized discharge of pollutants. 54

55 4.1309 DISCHARGE PROHIBITIONS 56

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No person shall discharge or cause to be discharged into the MS4 or waters of the state any materials, including but not limited to pollutants or waters containing any pollutants that cause or contribute to a violation of applicable water quality standards, other than storm water. This prohibition expressly includes, without limitation, illicit connections made in the past, regardless of whether the connection was permissible under law or practices applicable or prevailing at the time of connection.

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The commencement, conduct or continuance of any illicit discharge to the MS4 is prohibited except as described 63 64 as follows:

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(1) The following discharges are exempt from discharge prohibitions established by this ordinance: water line flushing or other potable water sources, landscape irrigation or lawn watering, diverted stream flows, rising ground water, ground water infiltration, uncontaminated pumped ground water, foundation or footing drains (not including active groundwater dewatering systems), crawl space pumps, air conditioning condensation, springs, individual residential car washing, natural riparian habitat or wetland flows, swimming pools (if dechlorinated - typically less than one PPM chlorine), firefighting activities, and any other water source not containing pollutants.

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(2) Dye testing is an allowable discharge, but requires a verbal notification to the LCD prior to the time of the test.

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(3) The prohibition shall not apply to any non-storm water discharge permitted under an WPDES permit, waiver, or waste discharge order issued to the discharger and administered under the authority of the Wisconsin DNR, provided that the discharger is in full compliance with all requirements of the permit, waiver, or order and other applicable laws and regulations, and provided that written approval has been granted for any discharge to the storm drain system.

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4.1310 NOTIFICATION OF SPILLS

Notwithstanding other requirements of law, as soon as any person responsible for a facility or operation, or responsible for emergency response for a facility or operation has information of any known or suspected release of materials which are resulting or may result in illicit discharges or pollutants discharging into storm water, the MS4, or water of the state, said person shall take all necessary steps to ensure the discovery, containment, and cleanup of such release. In the event of such a release of hazardous materials said person shall immediately notify emergency response agencies of the occurrence via emergency dispatch services. In the event of a release of nonhazardous materials, said person shall notify the LCD in person or by phone or facsimile immediately. Notifications in person or by phone shall be confirmed by written notice addressed and mailed to the LCD within three business days of the phone notice.

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4.1311 INDUSTRIAL OR CONSTRUCTION SITE DISCHARGES

Any person subject to an industrial or construction site WPDES storm water discharge permit or a Rock County Construction Site Erosion Control or Storm Water Management Permit shall comply with all provisions of such permit. Proof of compliance with said permit may be required in a form acceptable to the LCD prior to the allowing of discharges to the MS4.

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4.1312 INSPECTIONS

101 (1) The LCD shall be permitted to enter and inspect any property subject to regulation under this ordinance as often as may be necessary to determine compliance with this ordinance. If a discharger has security measures in force that require proper identification and clearance before entry into its premises, the discharger shall make the necessary arrangements to allow access to representatives of the LCD.

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106 (2) LCD shall be permitted ready access to all parts of the premises for the purposes of inspection, sampling, examination and copying of records that must be kept under the conditions of a WPDES permit to discharge storm water, and the performance of any additional duties as defined by state and federal law

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110 (3) If the LCD has been refused access to any part of the premises from which storm water is discharged, and he/she is able to demonstrate probable cause to believe that there may be a violation of this ordinance, or that there is a need to inspect and/or sample as part of a routine inspection and sampling program designed to verify compliance with this ordinance or any order issued hereunder, or to protect the overall public health, safety, and welfare of the community, then the LCD may seek issuance of a search warrant from any court of competent jurisdiction.

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4.1313 ENFORCEMENT AND PENALTIES

118 (1) Any illicit discharge initiated after the effective date of this ordinance by any person, firm, association, 119 or corporation subject to the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed a violation unless conducted in 120 compliance with the requirements of this ordinance.

121 (2) Every violation of this ordinance is a public nuisance. Compliance with this ordinance may be enforced by injunctional order at the suit of the County pursuant to sec. 59.69 (11), Wis. Stats. It shall not be necessary 122 123 to prosecute for forfeiture before resorting to injunctional proceedings.

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- (3) When the LCD finds that a person has violated a prohibition or failed to meet a requirement of this ordinance, the LCD may order compliance by written notice of violation to the responsible person via certified mail. Such notice may require without limitation:
 - (A) The performance of monitoring, analyses, and reporting;
 - (B) The elimination of illicit connections or discharges;
 - (C) That violating discharges, practices, or operations shall cease and desist;
- (D) The abatement or remediation of storm water pollution or contamination hazards and the restoration 131 132 of any affected property; and
 - (E) The implementation of source control or treatment BMPs.

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(4) Upon receipt of written notification from the LCD, the responsible person shall correct the activity as necessary to meet the specifications and schedule set forth in the notice.

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141 142 (5) If abatement of a violation and/or restoration of affected property is required, the notice shall set forth a deadline within which such remediation or restoration must be completed. Said notice shall further advise that, should the violator fail to remediate or restore within the established deadline, the work will be done by the LCD or a contractor and the expense thereof shall be charged to the violator. It shall be unlawful for any person, owner, agent or person in possession of any premises to refuse to allow the LCD or designated contractor to enter upon the premises for the purposes set forth above.

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145 (6) If the responsible person does not comply with the provisions of a notice of violation, the LCD may request 146 the Corporation Counsel to obtain a cease and desist order in any court with jurisdiction.

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148 (7) Any person, firm, association or corporation violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be subject to a forfeiture of no less than 500 dollars, nor more than 5,000 dollars, and the costs of prosecution, 149 150 including staff time, per offense. Each day a violation exists shall constitute a separate offense.

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(8) In lieu of enforcement proceedings, penalties, and remedies authorized by this Ordinance, the LCD may impose upon a violator alternative compensatory actions, such as attendance at compliance workshops, creek cleanup, etc.

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156 4.1314 COST OF LCD ABATEMENT OF THE VIOLATION

In the instance of LCD abatement of the violation due to lack of compliance above, within 15 days after LCD 157 abatement of the violation, the owner of the property will be notified of the cost of abatement, including administrative costs. The property owner may file a written protest objecting to the amount of the assessment within 30 days. If the amount due is not paid within a timely manner as determined by the decision of the LCD or by the expiration of the time in which to file an appeal, the charges shall become a special assessment against the 161 162 property and shall constitute a lien on the property for the amount of the assessment.

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164 4.1315 DEFINITIONS

165 For the purposes of this ordinance, the following shall mean:

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176 Hazardous Materials: Any material, including any substance, waste, or combination thereof, which because of its quantity, concentration, or physical, chemical, or infectious characteristics may cause, or significantly 177 contribute to, a substantial present or potential hazard to human health, safety, property, or the environment when 178 improperly treated, stored, transported, disposed of, or otherwise managed. 179

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Illicit Discharge: Any discharge to the MS4 that is not composed entirely of storm water except discharges 181 182 authorized by a WPDES permit or exempted in by this Ordinance

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Illicit Connections: An illicit connection is defined as either of the following: Any drain or conveyance, whether on the surface or subsurface, which allows an illicit discharge to enter the MS4 regardless of whether said drain or connection had been previously allowed, permitted, or approved by an LCD or, any drain or conveyance connected from a commercial or industrial land use to the MS4 which has not been documented in plans, 187 maps, or equivalent records and approved by the LCD. 188

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- 189 Industrial Activity: Activities subject to WPDES or NPDES Industrial Permits as defined in 40 CFR,
- 190 Section 122.26 (b)(14).

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Jurisdiction: The area where the MS4 permittee (County of Rock) has authority to enforce its ordinance(s) or otherwise has authority to exercise control over a particular area of concern.

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195 LCC: Rock County Land Conservation Committee

LCD: Rock County Land Conservation Department

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- Municipal Separate Storm Sewer System (MS4): A conveyance or system of conveyances including roads with drainage systems, municipal streets, catch basins, curbs, gutters, ditches, constructed channels or storm drains, which meet all of the following criteria:
 - (1) Owned or operated by a municipality.
 - (2) Designed or used for collecting or conveying storm water
 - (3) Which is not a combined sewer conveying both sanitary and storm water

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National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) Storm Water Discharge Permit: means a permit issued by EPA (or by a State under authority delegated pursuant to 33 USC § 1342(b)) that authorizes the discharge of pollutants to waters of the United States, whether the permit is applicable on an individual, group, or general area-wide basis.

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Non-Storm Water Discharge: Any discharge to the storm drain system that is not composed entirely of storm water.

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Permittee: The owner or operator of a MS4 authorized to discharge storm water into waters of the state (in this case the County of Rock).

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Permitted Area: The areas of land under the jurisdiction of the County of Rock that contribute to discharge from the County's MS4 which are regulated under a Municipal WPDES Permit pursuant to subch. I of NR 216 Wis. Adm. Code. The Permitted Area is limited to any of the following:

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(1) An "urbanized area", adjacent developing areas and areas whose runoff will connect to a municipal separate storm sewer regulated under subch. I of NR 216 Wis. Adm. Code; or

(2) An area associated with a municipal population of 10,000 or more and a population density of 1,000 or more per square mile, adjacent developing areas and areas whose runoff will connect to a MS4 regulated under subch. I of NR 216 Wis. Adm. Code; or

(3) An area that drains to a MS4 that is designated for permit coverage pursuant to s. NR 216.02(2) or 216.025, Wis. Adm. Code.

Person: means any individual, association, organization, partnership, firm, corporation or other entity recognized by law and acting as either the owner or as the owner's agent.

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Pollutant: Anything which causes or contributes to pollution. Pollutants may include, but are not limited to: paints, varnishes, and solvents; oil and other automotive fluids; non-hazardous liquid and solid wastes and yard wastes; refuse, rubbish, garbage, litter, or other discarded or abandoned objects, ordinances, and accumulations, so that same may cause or contribute to pollution; floatables; pesticides, herbicides, and fertilizers; hazardous substances and wastes; sewage, fecal coliform and pathogens; dissolved and particulate metals; animal wastes; wastes and residues that result from constructing a building or structure; and noxious or offensive matter of any kind.

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Premises: Any building, lot, parcel of land, or portion of land whether improved or unimproved including adjacent sidewalks and parking strips.

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242 **Storm Water:** Any surface flow, runoff, and drainage consisting entirely of water from any form of natural precipitation, and resulting from such precipitation.

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245 **Urbanized Area:** A place and the adjacent densely settled surrounding territory that together have a minimum 246 population of 50,000 people, as determined by the US Bureau of the Census based on the latest decennial federal 247 census.

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249 Wastewater: means any water or other liquid, other than uncontaminated storm water, discharged from a facility.

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WPDES Permit: A Wisconsin Pollutant Discharge Elimination System permit issued pursuant to ch 382 Wis. Stats by the DNR.

CREATION OF THE ROCK COUNTY ILLICIT DISCHARGE ORDINANCE

Executive Summary

The County of Rock was authorized by the Department of Natural Resources on November 13, 2006 to discharge storm water from the County owned Municipal Separate Storm Sewer Systems (MS4, i.e. road ditches and curb and gutter systems) in the Urbanized Area in Rock County under a Wisconsin Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (WPDES) General Permit. The most recent permit update occurred in May 2019 and is referenced as Permit No. WI-S050075-3. The original permitted Urbanized Area was determined by population density based on the 2000 census. The permitted area was revised based on the 2010 census population density. The County's WPDES MS4 general permit outlines certain minimum programs and documentation that must be developed to maintain compliance with the permit conditions of approval. One element is policies and procedures to detected and eliminate sources of illicit discharges. An Illicit Discharge is defined in the Ordinance as "any discharge to the MS4 that is not composed entirely of storm water except discharges authorized by a WPDES permit or exempted in by this Ordinance." Exemptions are included in the Ordinance on page 2 starting at line 14. It is the intention that approval of this Ordinance, along with an internal policy to be finalized at a later date, will meet this requirement of the Permit.

The Ordinance will be implemented in the County's Permitted Area, which, as noted above, is comprised of certain census blocks that are served by County Highways surrounding the Cities of Janesville and Beloit. The Ordinance will not be administered county-wide nor within any city or village.

The Land Conservation Department will take the lead on the administration of this Ordinance, though it is likely that the Public Works Department and Health Department will asked to assist if an enforcement action is necessary. It is not foreseen that this Ordinance will take substantial staff time or other resources to administer.

WHEREAS, Aging and Disability Resource Centers (ADRC) are the first place to go to get accurate unbiased information on all aspects of life related to aging or living with a disability; and,

WHEREAS, ADRC services include providing information and assistance, options and benefits counseling, coordinating short-term services, conducting functional screens, and enrollment processing and counseling; and

WHEREAS, in Wisconsin, there are currently 34 single-county ADRCs, 12 multi-county/tribal ADRCs, and seven tribal Aging and Disability Resource Specialists that work with an ADRC; and,

WHEREAS, the funding method for ADRCs has not been revised in more than a decade, and funding for ADRCs has not increased since 2006; and,

- The need to increase funding so that all ADRCs may effectively meet their mission, as outlined in the Scope of Services contract addendum; and,

WHEREAS, the Office for Resource Center Development (ORCD) within the Department of Health Services (DHS) established a stakeholder advisory group in 2017 to discuss ADRC funding; and,

WHEREAS, the stakeholder advisory group identified a number of issues with the current funding formula, such as:

- Dollars are distributed based on the date of ADRC establishment older ADRCs (Generation One) receive more funding than ADRCs established at a later date (Generation Two and Three ADRCs);
- The current formula does not take into account elements associated with health and social inequity that require a greater need for ADRC services;
- The current formula does not adjust with need Wisconsin's aging and disability populations continue to grow and are expected to grow significantly over the next 20 years;
- The current formula does not account for needed cost of living adjustments; and,

WHEREAS, a significant state GPR investment is needed to implement the recommendations of the stakeholder advisory group; and,

SUPPORT OF INCREASED COUNTY CHILD SUPPORT FUNDING

WHEREAS, Rock County Child Support Agency administers the Child Support Enforcement Program on behalf of the state, providing services to more than 31,500 Rock County residents including paternity establishment, obtaining child support and health insurance orders for children, and enforcing and modifying those orders; and

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WHEREAS, our children's well-being, economic security, and success in life are enhanced by parents who provide financial and emotional support; and

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WHEREAS, county child support agencies collected \$935 Million in child support during 2019 and established 98,405 health insurance orders for Wisconsin children; and

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WHEREAS, Rock County's Child Support Agency provides services to children as well as custodial and non-custodial parents that reduce childhood poverty rates, establish parental rights, and promote the involvement of both parents in the lives of their children; and

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WHEREAS, the economic security and social service programs provided by the Rock County Child Support Agency are needed by Wisconsin children and families now more than ever due to the economic downturn caused by COVID-19; and

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WHEREAS, state funding for county child support services has failed to keep up with county agency costs, which have steadily increased due to growing caseloads, inflation, and new federal regulations; and

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WHEREAS, Wisconsin's Child Support Enforcement Program has fallen from 2^{nd} in the nation for collecting current support to 5^{th} ; and

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WHEREAS, Wisconsin's decreased performance has led to the state losing out on an estimated \$70,000 in potential federal incentive payments between calendar year 2019 and 2020; and

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WHEREAS, an abrupt federal interpretation change in June 2019 eliminated \$4.2 million in federal birth cost recovery matching funds for Wisconsin; and

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WHEREAS, Wisconsin's strong performance in child support is at risk without additional state funding. Further drops in performance would result in additional reductions to federal funding for Wisconsin; and

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WHEREAS, decreased federal funding would lead to less funding for Rock County's Child Support Agency. This could lead to reductions in child support enforcement staff and services and reduced child support collections; and

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WHEREAS, new state investments in child support are amplified by a generous federal match. Every \$1 of state GPR invested in the Child Support Program generates \$2 in federal matching funds; and

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WHEREAS, Wisconsin's Child Support Enforcement Program is incredibly cost-effective, collecting an average of \$6.20 in support for every dollar invested in the program.



EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

OVERVIEW

Rock County has been working on a long-range facility master plan. Part of the plan is to replace the aged Pinehurst Building currently utilized for the Sheriff's Office: Administration; Patrol Bureau, Support Services Bureau; Detective Bureau and Special Investigations Unit (SIU); Evidence Processing and Storage; Armory; Locker-room and other associate training, and storage functions, RECAP; work release and the Huber dormitory housing.

- The building, constructed in 1929, was originally a tuberculosis sanatorium
 - o The footprint does not lend itself to efficient office space
 - o Recommended improvements are costly, perhaps prohibitive given the age and inefficiency of the present facility:
 - Roofing System
 - Windows
 - Replace original Electrical System
 - Upgrade existing lighting
 - Update existing electronics on 2nd and 3rd floors
 - Persistent water infiltration on the basement level
 - Replace fire alarm system
 - Security and confidentiality are compromised with clients/customers meeting staff in their current offices
 - o Public transportation is adequate in the present location and any modifications will need to preserve that access.
 - Parking is inadequate in quantity, location and public access to all staff and Sheriff vehicle lots is not restricted

In 2020, Venture Architects was hired by Rock County to provide program, concepts and budget for the Sheriff Space Needs Assessment.

STUDY GOALS

Goals:

- To evaluate facility needs for:
 - o Adjacencies of the Sheriff's Office with other County Facilities and Programs
 - o One "Main Entrance" creation of and preservation of a single point of entry for public to Sheriff's Department Services for accessibility to the public.
 - o Training Bureau (Discontinuous presently).
 - o Emergency Management Bureau (Discontinuous Presently) includes Emergency Operations Center (the EOC).
 - o Community Corrections Bureau (Discontinuous presently).
 - o Master Plan for future expansion.
 - o Additional Staff Parking "separated" from Public Parking.
- To evaluate space needs for:
 - o Replace Pinehurst Building
 - o Housing beds lost to be replaced by an addition to the existing facility
 - Renovate one existing cell to a shower in each Jail housing pod (thus minimizing inmate movement, staff and custodial security and enhancing staff efficiency)
 - o Renovate the existing hallway shower spaces in A, B, C and D units to conference (program) space
 - o Add Program Space and Outdoor Recreation for existing Jail Housing
 - o Reevaluate the Sheriff's Office Program previously completed
 - Verify no overlap of spaces between the Pinehurst Replacement and the Sheriff's Office.

FACILITY RECOMMENDATIONS

The Study recommends the adoption of a facility master plan that will:

- Design for one "main" entrance to the Sheriff's Office, Jail, RECAP and the Community Corrections Bureau
 - o Pinehurst should be razed.
- Organize and improve the Sheriff Administration facility to provide better nonstaff areas and consolidate Evidence functions
- Pinehurst Housing beds to be reclassified to better accommodate the occupancy needs.
 - RECAP Housing and program space including a computer lab;
 - o All Female Housing Pod;
 - Special Needs Housing for infectious disease control and management and mental health programming
 - o Replace Dormitory Housing with new Direct Supervision
- Provide contemporary Indoor/Outdoor Recreation for existing Jail Housing and any new housing
- New Jail Kitchen, Laundry, Storage and Receiving Dock
- Video Visitation, Video Conferencing and Video Court capability at a central location
- Suicide Observation Cells in Medical area.
- Include Community Corrections Bureau and Re-entry/Release areas in the facility
- Include Emergency Management with EOC and co-located
- Include a Training Bureau and co-located

The benefits to Rock County include:

- Improved inmate treatment and rehabilitation, with the required program spaces to reduce recidivism.
- Improved inmate release and intake (focused unified approach to re-entry to reduce inclusion of contraband and streamline the process).
- Improved work environment for efficiency, morale and unity of staff thereby communicated to the inmate community.
- A more Secure and safe facility.
- Food service and laundry to accommodate population needs thus presenting better hygiene and a healthier population.
- Better accessibility to services.

- Improved operations by minimizing inmate movement: distance and time to escort inmates.

- Improved parking quantity, quality and visitor wayfinding on site.

 - o RECAP
- Seventeen (17) existing Cells (34 beds) to Shower Renovation. Existing showers off pod to be renovated to small Meeting Rooms.
- Other areas to be remodeled for Program and Conference rooms.
- Existing Maintenance Shop to be remodeled.



BUILDING CONCEPTS

Overview

Sheriff's Office occupies various locations on the County Site – the Pinehurst building itself, the Jail connected to the Pinehurst building, parts of the HCC, and the Community corrections Building near the UW Extension. A goal of the project was to collect all Sheriff Operations into one location.

Several locations are appropriate for the program identified and were considered. Ten options were presented and the option that best serves the functional goals of the Sheriff's Office was selected for consideration. The options included single and multiple story solutions.

The option selected to be advanced is labeled 4B.

It consists of:

A two-story addition to the existing Sheriff's Office on the west side.

Combined entrance for the Sheriff's Office and Jail maintaining a single point of entrance.

Additions to replace Jail functions housed in the present Pinehurst facility added to the east side of the existing Jail.

A New Food Service and Laundry addition to the south side of the existing Jail.

Remodeling of various magnitudes within the present Jail facility.

Provisions for adequate recreation and custodial enrichment, safety, learning and to reduce recidivism.

The sequence that is best in terms of operational integrity and that serves the objectives of the Rock County Sheriff Office is:

- 1. Replace current Jail beds in the Pinehurst facility;
- 2. Construct new LES space near the present facility;
- 3. Raze the now empty Pinehurst Building.





Authorizing COVID-19 Response Funding and Amending the 2021 Budget

WHEREAS, 2020 the federal government provided funding to state governments through the CARES
 Act, a portion of which was subsequently provided to local governments through the Governor's Routes
 to Recovery program and other grant programs to support response to COVID-19; and,

WHEREAS, in its most recent relief package, the federal government has not provided any additional COVID-19 response funds for state or local governments; and,

WHEREAS, the Public Health Department will be required to continue its current COVID-19 response efforts, including contact tracing and disease investigation, outbreak management, public education and outreach, data management, advising schools, long-term care facilities, and other organizations, and responding to inquiries from the media, the public, and community partners; and

WHEREAS, in addition, in 2021 Rock County will be responding to the pandemic in areas that include community testing, coordination of vaccine distribution, public education and messaging on vaccine safety, continued PPE purchases for first responders and direct care staff, and other areas; and,

WHEREAS, funding for additional staff positions will be necessary to support the Public Health Department, the Emergency Operations Center, and the community's response, particularly as it relates to vaccine coordination, vaccine administration, and administrative and support functions; and

WHEREAS, estimated expenditures for the community testing site through March 10, 2021, include approximately \$47,000 for food for the Wisconsin National Guard and other personnel on site, and \$19,000 for contracted staff through Professional Services Group (PSG) to support operations; and

WHEREAS, without additional federal funding, Rock County will be required to expend its own funding to support these costs, and providing explicit budget authority in a separate cost center will expedite expenditures when needed, allow for increased flexibility, and provide better tracking and transparency.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Rock County Board of Supervisors duly assembled this _____ day of _____, 2021 does hereby authorize additional funding for COVID-19 response in the amount of \$250,000 and amend the 2021 Budget as follows:

Executive Summary

Federal funding to state and local governments through the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act will no longer be provided after 2020, and the recent federal COVID-19 relief package did not provide any additional funding to state or local governments. Consequently, Rock County will need to expend its own funding if it is going to continue to respond to COVID-19 in a number of areas.

First, Rock County has taken over management of the COVID-19 community testing site located at Blackhawk Technical College. In addition to using paid County staff and volunteers to staff the site, the County has entered into a contract with Professional Services Group (PSG) to fill the remaining support staff slots as needed. It is estimated up to \$19,000 may be needed for this contract. In addition, the County is responsible for providing lunch, dinner, and snacks for the Wisconsin National Guard members conducting testing as well as volunteers and other staff on site. The County has entered into a contract with Best Events for this purpose at an estimated cost of about \$47,000 through March 10, 2021, when the current approved deployment of the National Guard will end.

Second, while vaccines are distributed, the County will still need to support ongoing public health measures to protect staff and limit the spread of the virus. Personal protective equipment (PPE) and other purchases will continue to be necessary.

Third, efforts related to vaccine distribution and public education will require expenditures. The County's Emergency Operations Center has established a Vaccine Advisory Committee, which is to make recommendations that will support vaccine distribution in Rock County. This group has discussed the need for more support in the areas of coordination and administrative functions, particularly as the State's vaccination plan advances past Phase 1A (health care personnel and residents of long-term care facilities). Approving this funding would provide the County flexibility to create limited-term or project staff to serve in a vaccine coordinator role (or to backfill positions for current staff redeployed to that function) and to provide administrative support, such as will be needed for data entry into the Wisconsin Immunization Registry, as needed.

\$250,000 is requested to support these costs over the next several months. The County Board will be kept apprised of the status of these efforts as they become more defined.


The Rock County Sheriff's Office has recently had a significate rise in the number of positive Covid-19 cases in our Correctional Facility. Therefore, the Sheriff's Office is attempting to utilize all of the technology possible to combat the virus, and minimize the spread throughout the inmate population, as well as the staff.

On 11/20/20 we purchased the first Skytron UVC Disinfecting Robot, utilizing a portion of the County's CARES Act funding. The Skytron UVC Disinfecting Robot is a movable unit, which is activated in an evacuated, and highly controlled area within the facility. It is mobile, so it has been utilized throughout the corrections facility, using caution to make sure of the safety of both inmates and staff. Due to the number of locations that need to be disinfected, a second unit is needed as soon as possible.

The Skytron UVC Disinfecting Robot will be purchased from Alliance Medical Corporation, of Cedarburg, WI. The total cost of the unit is \$40,799.25. This purchase has been discussed with the Financial Director and General Funds will need to be utilized for this purchase.

WHEREAS, Rock County, Wisconsin (the "County") has sufficient funds on hand to redeem the 2021 maturity of the County's \$7,300,000 General Obligation Promissory Notes, dated September 25, 2012 (the "2012 Notes") which may be called for prior redemption on March 1, 2019 or any date thereafter;

WHEREAS, the County Board deems it to be necessary, desirable and in the best interest of the County to proceed with the redemption of the 2021 maturity of the 2012 Notes on or after March 1, 2021 (the "Note Redemption").

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the County Board of the County that:

Section 1. Authorization of the Note Redemption. For the purpose of paying the cost of the Note Redemption, the County shall use funds on hand to redeem the 2021 maturity of the 2012 Notes on or after March 1, 2019.

In the event that any one or more provisions hereof shall for any reason be held to be illegal or invalid, such illegality or invalidity shall not affect any other provisions hereof. The foregoing shall take effect immediately upon adoption and approval in the manner provided by law.

ENDORSING THE ACCEPTANCE OF MEDICAID EXPANSION FUNDS AND PLACING HEALTHCARE ADVISORY REFERENDUM ON THE SPRING 2021 COUNTY BALLOT

WHEREAS, the Board of Supervisors of Rock County hold the following beliefs: all people deserve the opportunity to live in a state that creates the conditions to live a healthy life; policy should strive toward the elimination of health disparities; and it is essential to provide healthcare to the state's most vulnerable populations; and

WHEREAS, the COVID-19 pandemic has heightened the need for health care coverage; and as of May 2020, there were 175,893 non-disabled adults without minor children who had coverage under Wisconsin Medicaid. This was an increase of nearly 23,000 from March 2020, when the COVID-19 pandemic began, highlighting the importance of Medicaid in covering people who lost their health coverage and their incomes amid the pandemic; and,

 WHEREAS, the Affordable Care Act ("ACA") established a program of Medicaid expansion whereby in exchange for increased federal matching funds, states could elect to expand the number of individuals covered under state administered Medicaid programs but, historically the State of Wisconsin has refused the Medicaid expansion funds created by the ACA; and,

WHEREAS, estimates from 2019 indicate that the State of Wisconsin would save \$324.5 million if the state would accept federal Medicaid expansion funds which could be reinvested into critical health care programming; and,

WHEREAS, if the state were to expand Medicaid to cover adults earning up to 138 percent of the poverty level, the federal government would pay 90 percent of the cost of covering able-bodied, childless adults; by opting not to accept federal funding for Wisconsin Medicaid expansion under the ACA, the state is only receiving its regular federal match rate of 58.5 percent (Note: federal matching rate has been temporarily increased by federal legislation, in order to address the COVID-19 pandemic); and,

WHEREAS, a 2020 analysis by the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation estimates that 120,000 people in the state would gain access to Medicaid; direct costs for Medicaid would drop by nearly 7 percent, despite the fact that more people would be covered; and the state's uninsured rate would drop by 16 percent; and,

WHEREAS, Wisconsin is one of only 12 states that have not accepted Medicaid expansion per the Kaiser Family Foundation website; and,

WHEREAS, 19 counties, including Rock County, have passed resolutions urging Wisconsin to accept Medicaid expansion funds, a position that has been adopted by the Wisconsin Counties Association; and,

WHEREAS, the voters of Rock County should be able to provide an advisory opinion to support or oppose the acceptance of these Federal Medicaid funds.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Rock County Board of Supervisors duly assembled this ____ day of _____, 2021 does hereby support and endorse the acceptance of Medicaid Expansion funds by the State and urges the legislature to accept such funds as a part of the 2021-2023 biennium budget.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Rock County Board of Supervisors does hereby direct the Rock County Clerk to place the following advisory referendum question on the countywide ballot at the election to be held on April 6, 2021:

"Should the State of Wisconsin accept Affordable Care Act Federal Medicaid funds earmarked to expand health insurance coverage to 176,000 additional Wisconsin residents resulting in the state saving \$324.5 million?"

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BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Rock County Clerk is directed to forward a copy of this resolution to the Office of the Governor, all members of the Wisconsin State Legislature, and the Wisconsin Counties Association.









WI Eligibility Levels (as a % of FPL)




















National Share of Those that Hold Favorable Views of Medicaid
