WHEREAS, the Rock County Board of Supervisors, representing the citizens of Rock County, wish to recognize the Rock County Human Services Social Workers for their excellence in delivering services to the citizens of Rock County; and,

WHEREAS, the Social Workers in the Aging and Disability Resource Center (ADRC) and Adult Protective Services (APS) Division, support frail elderly and adults with physical and/or developmental disabilities as well as their family and caregivers. APS staff serve to protect vulnerable adults from abuse and neglect by investigating allegations and seeking out services, such as guardianship, to help individuals remain safe and secure in their homes and community. ADRC Social Workers provide guidance, support, and options to people who struggle navigating through the multitude of programs available. They assist people to make informed decisions by explaining the array of service options that are available to them in our community. Together, the ADRC and APS staff provide our community's most at-risk adults with the support they need to help them remain safe in our community and as independent as possible; and,

WHEREAS, the Social Workers in the Behavioral Health Division provide high quality treatment and support services to individuals and families experiencing mental illness and substance abuse challenges across a comprehensive continuum of care, thereby reducing the need for restrictive institutional care and out-of-home placement. They provide assertive outreach to individuals with complex needs and engage them in welcoming and empathic relationships. These social workers assist clients in improving their quality of life, as defined by the client, and provide person centered, rehabilitative services focused on hope and recovery; and,

WHEREAS, the Social Workers in the Children, Youth and Families (CYF) Division provide familycentered and strength-based services to children and families involved in the children protection and
juvenile justice systems. CYF Social Workers are dedicated to ensuring child safety as well as
supervising youth on juvenile supervision. Daily, social workers in the CYF Division work with highrisk families in the community to inspire hope and build skills for positive change. CYF Social Workers
intervene when children are alleged to be abused and neglected, and engage youth who are in violation of
the law. Countless children, youth and families are positively affected by the tireless work of CYF Social
Workers.

Update on Purchases Authorized Under Emergency Declaration

At its March 26, 2020, meeting, the County Board ratified the Declaration of Local State of Emergency issued on March 16, 2020. This Declaration, in conjunction with emergency purchasing authority already provided to the County Administrator in the Purchasing Ordinance and Financial Policy and Procedure Manual, has provided flexibility to proceed more expediently than would have been allowed under the normal County Board approval processes.

Having reached the first 30 days of the 60-day Declaration, I wanted to provide you with an update on the purchases I have authorized and provide a brief rationale. The attached spreadsheet lists these purchases, and a brief explanation follows below.

#### Medical Examiner's Office

The Rock County Mass Fatality Incident Response Plan, established in 2015, vests responsibility for managing the results of a mass casualty incident with the Rock County Medical Examiner's Office. This includes when insufficient morgue or cooler space exists among current facilities, including hospitals, funeral homes, and Rock County's own cooler.

Based on discussions with the Medical Examiner's Office, early estimates of potential mortality, and the unknown surrounding this situation, we have purchased three refrigerated trailers, each with capacity to hold around 40 bodies. The total cost of these three trailers is \$69,432. If not needed, these trailers can be resold like other surplus County property; the Food and Drug Administration has recently provided guidance that even if used for this purpose, trailers can be sanitized and repurposed for general shipping.

Due to a shortage of body bags available in the market, we have purchased two CadaverSeal MassPaks, which are specifically designed for mass casualty events and would allow bodies to be safely vacuum-sealed in transportable bags at the hospitals. The total cost of these two MassPaks is \$68,127. Combined, these provide replacement capacity for approximately 900 body bags. These MassPaks have a shelf life of 10 years.

In addition, the Medical Examiner's Office has been authorized to purchase various other supplies totaling \$8,422, as noted on the spreadsheet.

#### 911 Communications Center

As noted by Communications Center Director Kathy Sukus at the April 9, 2020, County Board meeting, I authorized the purchase of six specialized laptops and accompanying professional installation and maintenance services that will allow the 911 Center to receive and dispatch calls from any location with access to the County's network. In order to adhere to physical distancing requirements for staff, the 911 Center is unable to use the backup site located at the Town of Beloit Fire Station and has redeployed staff to the conference room at the Department of Public Works building on Newville Road in Janesville. These laptops, which have been under consideration for several years, provide flexibility to both answer and dispatch calls from any location. They also allow us to separate 911 Center staff to ensure continuity of operations should COVID-19 spread in the 911 Center.

The total cost for these six specialized laptops and related installation and maintenance services, which are provided by our current vendor, is \$79,434. This cost includes a seven-year maintenance contract.

#### Information Technology

Rock County Information Technology has been working hard to assist staff in redeploying to remote work sites consistent with the Governor's Safer-at-Home order. Several purchases were required to increase the number of staff able to remotely access the County's network through a product called Citrix. I authorized the purchase of an additional 400 Citrix licenses at a cost of \$41,044. This also required the purchase of an additional 300 Microsoft licenses at a cost of \$24,000. To increase the network capacity of this new remote work environment, we also had to purchase an upgrade for Citrix (known as a Netscaler) at a cost of \$28,738.

In the 2020 budget, the County Board approved an expedited replacement cycle of computers throughout County departments. In support of increased remote work, I approved the purchase of 200 laptops for which funding was already included in the budget. Under a normal situation, a resolution authorizing this \$155,600 purchase would have gone to the County Board for approval prior to submitting the order with the vendor.

One change we will be making to our IT strategy going forward is to move towards a mostly laptop environment to allow more flexibility for staff to work remotely and in emergency situations.

#### Personal Protective Equipment

As you are all aware, the shortage of Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) available across the country and world has been a primary problem in keeping safe first responders, health care workers, and others who in the course of their work may be exposed to people with COVID-19. In order to do all we can to procure sufficient amounts of PPE to keep frontline staff providing these services in Rock County safe, I have authorized the County's Emergency Operations Center (EOC) to make numerous and significant purchases of PPE not only for County staff but for distribution to local jurisdictions as they run short.

Two recent and significant purchases authorized include \$208,250 for 49,000 KN95 masks, and \$85,000 for 25,000 protective gowns.

In addition to these purchases, the Sheriff's Office and the Department of Public Works under their own budgetary authority have made numerous purchases of PPE and related items, including masks, gloves, hand sanitizer, and cleaning supplies.

The EOC has implemented a tracking system whereby County departments and local jurisdictions report remaining inventory and the rate at which they are burning through their PPE supplies so that the EOC's central store of PPE can be prioritized and distributed to those most in need. PPE provided to local jurisdictions will be tracked, and agencies will eventually be billed.

#### Funding for Authorized Purchases

As we briefly discussed at the April 9 County Board meeting, many of these purchases will be eligible for reimbursement from the federal government through the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), although we should not assume this is guaranteed. Some FEMA programs provide 75% reimbursement, while others may provide up to 100% reimbursement. We will continue to track these purchases throughout our response for this reason.

Other than the budgeted laptops, these purchases were not contemplated when the 2020 Budget was approved. Consequently, at some point we will return to the County Board with a budget amendment to identify an appropriate funding source.

#### Future Purchases and Planning

I expect the need for purchases under this emergency authority will decrease over the next 30 days. However, if there are circumstances requiring emergency purchases, I will similarly report them to the Board no later than the County Board meeting following end of the current Emergency Declaration.

As experts debate when the "peak" will occur under the current Safer-at-Home order, and as governments consider when to relax physical distancing measures, it seems likely that Rock County will experience one or more future peaks as the virus is allowed to spread again among a larger segment of the population. The more extensive purchases we have made now will provide us flexibility in managing future surge capacity needs throughout this crisis.

I welcome your feedback and further direction about the use of the authority you have provided to me.

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WHEREAS, the PACE program and the NRCS Agriculture Conservation Easement Program (ACEP) require that easement appraisals be completed by a State of Wisconsin Certified General Appraiser and meet the Uniform Standards of Professional Appraisal Practice; and,

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WHEREAS, the purchase price of the easement was determined with the aforementioned methodology and the appraisal valuations have been approved by the NRCS; and,

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WHEREAS, the LCD worked closely with the NRCS staff to secure the ACEP funding for said easement purchase and will receive said funding at time of the easement closing(s); and,

WHEREAS, each party to PACE are required to have financial interests as follows; Landowner will donate twenty five percent (25%) of the easement value, totaling \$98,000, the County will contribute twenty five percent (25%) of the easement value, totaling \$98,000 and the NRCS will contribute fifty percent (50%) of the easement value, totaling \$196,000 for a total purchase price of \$294,000.

#### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

This resolution authorizes the Land Conservation Department (LCD) to finalize acquisition of the Agricultural Conservation Easement under the Purchase of Agricultural Conservation Easement Program (PACE) for the William and Marion Barlass Property, which is described as follows:

#### YAHARA RIVER BASIN ADAPTIVE MANAGEMENT PROJECT APPROVAL OF INCENTIVE PAYMENT

- WHEREAS, Yahara Watershed Improvement Network (Yahara WINs) approached the Land
   Conservation Department (LCD) in 2016 to discuss the merits of developing a partnership for the
   Adaptive Management Program, for Rock County's portion of the Yahara River Watershed; and,
  - WHEREAS, Adaptive Management Projects allows municipalities to implement phosphorus reducing projects within the watershed in lieu of making very expensive upgrades to their wastewater treatment facilities while meeting water quality goals for phosphorus. The most cost effective projects for phosphorus reduction can be found in the implementation of best management practices within the agricultural sector; and,

WHEREAS, through many discussions with Yahara WINs management and Land Conservation Department (LCD) staff a service agreement was developed, outlining all requirements for the programs goals and expectations for both parties, more specifically the agreement requires Yahara WINS to reimburse Rock County for all costs associated with the implementation of phosphorus runoff abatement best management practices and associated costs for staff and support for said project on a dollar for dollar basis; and,

WHEREAS, the Service Agreement was entered into by the Land Conservation Committee (LCC) and Yahara WINs in early 2017, which allowed the LCD to commence with the implementation phase of the Adaptive Management Project in Rock County's portion of the Yahara River Watershed; and,

WHEREAS, since early 2017, LCD staff has engaged landowners who expressed interest in program participation, which has resulted in best management practice installation agreements to be initiated by the land owners and the LCC; and,

WHEREAS, in some instances the BMP costs will exceed the Rock County's set financial thresholds which require additional approvals by the Finance Committee and County Board of Supervisors; and,

WHEREAS, the Rock County Best Management Practice Installation Agreement WINS-04.20 will exceed the aforesaid thresholds to provide funding for the establishment of a water quality harvestable buffer system in the Yahara River Watershed. The mentioned agreement is based on an incentive payment which requires the landowner to operate and maintain the BMP system for a period of fifteen years.

#### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

The Yahara River Watershed is threatened by excessive phosphorus from sources identified as agricultural runoff, urban storm water and wastewater treatment plant discharges. The elevated phosphorus levels are a threat to water quality and aquatic life throughout the Yahara Watershed. The Yahara Watershed Improvement Network (Yahara WINs), began in 2012 to reduce all phosphorus loads and meet water quality standards established by the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (WDNR). This program employs watershed adaptive management, a strategy in which all producers of phosphorus pollution, point and non-point sources, in the Yahara watershed basin work together to meet water quality goals. This strategy is more effective and less expensive than the sources working separately on individual solutions. Partners in Yahara WINs include cities, villages, towns, wastewater treatment plants, agricultural producers, environmental groups and others.

Yahara WINS approached the Land Conservation Department in 2016 to discuss the merits of developing a partnership to apply best management practices in Rock County's portion of the Yahara River watershed. A Service Agreement was entered into by both parties and the Land Conservation Department's Budget was amended to facilitate the cost share and/or incentive agreements.

Since then, staff has been engaged with various landowners whom expressed interest in the overall programs goals. Numerous agreements have been signed by landowners who have implemented best management practices. Knowing a few agreements would exceed the financial threshold established by County Board rules, requiring actions by both the Finance Committee and County Board of Supervisors. Rock County Best Management Practice Installation Agreement WINS-04.20 in the sum of \$55,600. This payment will exceed the established threshold and requires approval from County Board.

Yahara WINS reimburses the County for costs associated with the aforementioned work, on a dollar for dollar basis.
