# Aging and Disability Resource Center (ADRC) of Rock County and Rock County Human Services-Mental Health Division

The Rock County Human Services-Mental Health Division and the Aging and Disability Resource Center of Rock County have a shared commitment to provide consumer-focused services that are easy to access and navigate for adults with disabilities in Rock County. Although individuals with mental health issues are not a *primary* target group served by the Aging and <u>Disability</u> Resource Center, it is understood that the ADRC will provide information and referral services to individuals with mental health issues in conjunction with the Mental Health Division. It is with this joint mission and understanding that we agree to do the following:

- 1. Cultivate a strong relationship between the ADRC and the Mental Health Division staff through ongoing and open communication; Administration from the Mental Health Division will every six months (or more frequently if needed) with ADRC Administration to discuss programs and services available through the Mental Health Division as well as review processes between agencies to ensure service goals are obtained.
- 2. Provide training opportunities; ADRC staff must be knowledgeable regarding community mental health programs, services, and resources. To assist the ADRC staff, the mental health division will be requested to present information to the ADRC staff on topics such as mental health diagnosis, substance abuse issues, and treatment.
- 3. Follow protocols for appropriate cross referrals;
  - Individuals in the community who call the ADRC and present a risk of harm to themselves (i.e. suicidal thoughts) and who may be in need of an emergency mental health assessment will be warm transferred to the Crisis Intervention line.
  - Individuals in the community who call the ADRC and present a need for detoxification services due to incapacitation from alcohol will be warm transferred to the Crisis Intervention line.
  - Individuals in the community who call the ADRC and who are seeking mental health treatment services from the county such as the Community Support Program, outpatient therapy or case management will be referred to the Mental Health Divisions' Connections Line.
  - Individuals in the community who call the ADRC who have Alcohol or Other Drug Addictions (AODA) but who do not have the financial resources to pay for treatment will be referred to Beloit Area Community Health to set up an appointment.
  - Individuals who are existing clients of the Mental Health Division and who may be eligible for a publicly funded program such as MA-Waiver, will be referred to the ADRC through their case manager by calling the ADRC directly.

- Children ages 17 ½ who are aging into adults programs will be referred to the ADRC through their case manager by calling the ADRC directly.
- 4. Refer adults-at-risk who have mental illness; Should an I&A Specialist receive a call regarding a mentally ill adult-at-risk who has a case manager in the county mental health division, the ADRC staff will call the clients' case manager directly and forward the adult-at-risk information. If the adult-at-risk is not a current client of the mental health division, the I & A Specialist will forward the information to the LTS APS worker for investigation.

If, after the investigation, it is determined the adult-at-risk needs additional community services, the investigative agency will refer the individual to the ADRC to provide information and assistance.

- 5. Promote Services; The ADRC and the Mental Health Division will promote services from both agencies, as appropriate, at community meetings and/or events.
- 6. Abide by confidentiality standards; The Aging and Disability Resource Center and the Mental Health Division will follow Federal and State statutes and regulations governing confidentiality. If the exchange is necessary to enable an employee to perform his or her duties the exchange is allowed.

By signature, the Aging and Disability Resource Center of Rock County through the Rock County Department of Human Services and the Rock County Mental Health Division agree to follow this memorandum of understanding. This memorandum of understanding shall be reviewed at least annually and shall be on-going unless one or both of the parties provide information for its modification.

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# Aging and Disability Resource Center (ADRC) of Rock County and Rock County Council on Aging

The Rock County Council on Aging and the Aging and Disability Resource Center of Rock County have a shared commitment to provide consumer-focused services that are easy to access and navigate for the older adults of Rock County. It is with this joint mission that we agree to do the following:

1. Cultivate a strong relationship between the ADRC and the Council on Aging staff through information sharing, cross-training and joint training opportunities. This will be accomplished in two ways:

-Invitations will be made to the COA staff to present at the ADRC monthly staff meetings on topics and issues the COA is involved in directly.

-An ADRC I&A Specialist will participate in the monthly COA Advisory Committee and Nutrition Project Advisory Council meetings.

This will allow for the exchange of new information regarding benefits, services, and supports available to the consumers we all serve. In addition, timely information will be shared on new initiatives occurring within each respective agency. The Elder Benefit Specialist will attend the ADRC staff meetings as schedules permit.

- 2. Referrals to the Council on Aging staff may be made by 1) a warm telephone transfer, 2) providing contact information to the ADRC client, or 3) making a direct referral to the Council on Aging office.
- 3. The ADRC and the Council on Aging will promote services from both agencies.
- 4. ADRC staff will assist seniors in making self-referrals to the appropriate Elder Benefit Specialist to facilitate and schedule appointments. Council on Aging staff will follow policies and procedures as developed to make referrals to the ADRC.
- 5. The Aging and Disability Resource Center and the Council on Aging will follow Federal and State statutes and regulations governing confidentiality. If the exchange is necessary to enable an employee to perform his or her duties the exchange is allowed.
- 6. The shared SAMS database will be maintained by the ADRC. Council on Aging staff will relay new resource information they become aware of to the ADRC for inclusion in the SAMS database.
- 7. The ADRC will submit articles for the Council on Aging's publication, *Senior Review*, as new programs or information develops.

8. The Council on Aging Director and ADRC Manager and Supervisor will meet quarterly to discuss processes, procedures, and current programs to encourage a successful relationship and enhance the awareness of each others department.

By signature, the Aging and Disability Resource Center of Rock County through the Rock County Department of Human Services and the Rock County Council on Aging agree to follow this memorandum of understanding. This memorandum of understanding shall be reviewed at least annually and shall be on-going unless one or both of the parties provide information for its modification.

# Aging and Disability Resource Center (ADRC) of Rock County and Rock County Developmental Disabilities Board

The Rock County Developmental Disabilities Board (DDB) and the Aging and Disability Resource Center (ADRC) of Rock County have a shared commitment to provide consumer-focused services that are easy to access and navigate for adults with disabilities in Rock County. It is with this joint mission that we agree to do the following:

- 1. Cultivate a strong relationship between the ADRC and the DDB staff through monthly meetings: Administration from the DDB and/or its designated/contracted agency will meet quarterly with ADRC Administration. These meetings will allow for the exchange of information regarding programs and processes between agencies and to ensure service goals are obtained.
- 2. Receive updated Wait list information: The DDB and/or Catholic Charities will provide an updated waitlist to the ADRC monthly.
- 3. Follow protocols for appropriate cross referrals:
  - When individuals in the community call the DDB directly for assistance, the DDB staff person will discuss their needs. If this individual is not on the DDB waitlist or needs resource assistance, DDB staff will warm transfer the caller to the ADRC to speak with an I&A Specialist.
  - When individuals in the community call Catholic Charities directly for assistance, the Catholic Charities staff person will discuss their needs. If this individual is not on the DDB waitlist or needs resource assistance, Catholic Charities staff will call the ADRC directly to speak with an I&A Specialist or will refer the individual to call the ADRC.
  - When individuals in the community call the ADRC and they are not on the DDB
    waitlist, an I&A Specialist will provide information and assistance. If appropriate
    and requested, I&A staff will conduct a LTCFS. The LTCFS results, disability
    determination, and financial information will be forwarded to Catholic Charities
    weekly.
  - When individuals in the community call the ADRC and are on the DDB waitlist, the I&A Specialist will offer information and assistance. In addition, the ADRC staff will provide the individual information about their approximate wait list status and will refer them to the DDB for appropriate follow-up.
  - When parents of minors (children < 17 ½ years old) call the ADRC requesting Waiver services (CIP-Ia/b or the Children's Long Term Support Waiver) and the child is already on the DDB waitlist, the I & A Specialist will call Children's Long Term Support supervisor. If the child is NOT on the DDB waitlist, the I & A worker will direct the family to call Compass for screening and eligibility.
  - In situations that require immediate attention, the I&A Specialist will call the DDB directly.
- 4. Refer developmentally disabled adults-at-risk: Should an I&A Specialist receive a call regarding a developmentally disabled adult-at-risk, the ADRC staff will obtain the required information and fax the referral to the DDB and Catholic Charities to conduct

the investigation. The ADRC Administrative Assistant Specialist will also call the Administrative Assistant/DDB Deputy Director at the DDB to confirm receipt of the referral. If the adult-at-risk is an open client of the DDB, the I&A Specialist will call the clients' case manager directly and forward the adult-at-risk information. There may be situations in which the alleged victim is an out-of-county resident living in Rock County—should this occur, the ADRC will refer these individuals to the DDB who may cooperatively work with the county of residence on the investigation.

If, after the investigation, it is determined the adult-at-risk needs additional community services, the investigative agency will refer the Rock County individual to the ADRC of Rock County to provide information and assistance.

- 5. Promote services; The ADRC and the DDB will promote services from both agencies, as appropriate, at community events.
- 6. Uphold confidentiality; The ADRC and the DDB will follow Federal and State statutes and regulations governing confidentiality. If the exchange is necessary to enable an employee to perform his or her duties the exchange is allowed.

By signature, the Aging and Disability Resource Center of Rock County through the Rock County Department of Human Services and the Rock County Developmental Disabilities Board agree to follow this memorandum of understanding. This memorandum of understanding shall be reviewed at least annually and shall be on-going unless one or both of the parties provide information for its modification.

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# Aging and Disability Resource Center (ADRC) of Rock County and Rock County Long Term Support

The Rock County Long Term Support Division and the Aging and Disability Resource Center of Rock County have a shared commitment to provide consumer-focused services that are easy to access and navigate for adults with disabilities in Rock County. It is with this joint mission that we agree to do the following:

- 1. Cultivate a strong relationship between the ADRC and the Long Term Support Division through quarterly meetings: Supervisors from Long Term Support and the ADRC will meet quarterly with the LTS/ADRC Division Manager. These meetings will allow for the exchange of information regarding programs and processes between agencies and to ensure service goals are obtained.
- 2. Follow protocols for appropriate cross referrals:
  - Alzheimer's Family Caregiver Support Program (AFCSP): When an I&A Specialist assesses individuals for public funding or provides options counseling and the individual appears to be eligible for AFCSP, the I & A Specialist will also assess for AFCSP eligibility. Should the individual be AFCSP eligible, the I&A Specialist will forward this information to LTS/AFCSP supervisor. However, individuals who call the ADRC who request AFCSP funding and who do not appear to have a need for other programs will be referred directly to the AFCSP coordinator in Long Term Support to assess for program eligibility and case management.
  - SSI-E Benefit: Individuals who call the ADRC and who have a need for the SSI-E benefit will be screened for eligibility by an I & A Specialist. The I & A Specialist will complete forms, F-20812 (SSI-E Natural Residential Setting Application Checklist), F-20817 (Assessment Worksheet for Natural Residential Setting) and F-20818 (Certification for SSI-E Exceptional Expense Supplement.). The I & A Specialist will mail the original forms to DHS for approval. Once the ADRC receives the State approval, the I & A Specialist will call the client to make them aware they have been approved and will send the State approval letter and copies of the application forms to LTS.
  - Elder/Adult-at-Risk: Individuals who call the ADRC and are in an Adult-at-Risk situation will speak with an I & A Specialist. The I & A Specialist will complete an Elder/Adult at Risk Referral form (green) and will submit it to the Long Term Support Supervisor for assignment and investigation.
    - If, after the investigation, it is determined the adult-at-risk needs additional community services, the investigative agency will refer the individual to the ADRC to provide information and assistance.
  - Other Public Funding: Individuals who call the ADRC and it is determined by the I & A Specialist and the customer that public funding (MA-Waiver) will be pursued, the I & A Specialist will complete the LTCFS, Health Report, Receipt of Privacy Notice, Rights/Responsibilities form, and financial forms and forward this information to the Long Term Support Supervisor. In addition, the LTCFS will be released/transferred to LTS when a worker is assigned.

- Adult Family Homes: Individuals who call the ADRC and are interested in Adult Family Homes but who are not eligible for public funding, will be referred to the AFH Coordinator in LTS. In addition, the I & A Specialist will provide the customer with the State website for 3-4 bed Adult Family Homes.
- 3. Promote services; The ADRC and the Long Term Support Division will promote services from both agencies, as appropriate, at community events.
- 4. Uphold confidentiality; The Aging and Disability Resource Center and the Long Term Support Division will follow Federal and State statutes and regulations governing confidentiality. If the exchange is necessary to enable an employee to perform his or her duties the exchange is allowed.

By signature, the Aging and Disability Resource Center of Rock County through the Rock County Department of Human Services and the Long Term Support Division agree to follow this memorandum of understanding. This memorandum of understanding shall be reviewed at least annually and shall be ongoing unless one or both of the parties provide information for its modification.





	Opposing the State Budget Proposed Modifications in Aging and Disability Resource Centers
2	WHEREAS, the 2015-2017 State biennial budget proposes a number of changes that will negatively impact the statewide nationally recognized model for providing information and referral services to aging and disabled citizens through the Aging and Disability Resource Centers (ADRC) in the State of Wisconsin; and,
6 7 8 9	WHEREAS, the proposed changes that will negatively impact the current "one stop-shop" model of ADRC operations include: a) elimination of the local Aging and Disabilities Advisory Committee's; b) elimination of the counties "right of first refusal" to operate the Aging and Disability Resource Center; c) permitting the State to contract out all or a portion of the services currently provided by the ADRC, including administration of the Long Term Care Functional Screen; and,
L2 L3	WHEREAS, the State mandated the creation of a local Aging and Disability Advisory Committee with representation that mirrored the population being served, before any County could open an ADRC; and,
L6	WHEREAS, the vast majority of counties in the state have chosen to operate local Aging and Disability Resource Centers in their communities to serve their citizenry; and,
L9	WHEREAS, the Aging and Disability Resource Centers have been a "one-stop-shop" for local citizens in need of information and referral and long term care services; and,
22	WHEREAS, a piecemeal contracting of portions of the ADRC services will likely fragment the array of services currently delivered by the ADRC's and eviscerate the "one-stop-shop" concept upon which the ADRC's were originally established; and,
26	WHEREAS, the County ADRC's have provided outstanding service to the communities they serve and wish to continue to do so; and,
29	WHEREAS, since the ADRC's are working well, there is no reason to dismantle the manner the current ADRC's operate and that our local citizens have come to rely upon.
32	NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Rock County Board of Supervisors duly assembled this day of, 2015 does hereby authorize that this resolution be sent to the legislature indicating opposition to the proposed State budget modifications in the ADRC's.

Dear Senator Fred Risser:

On behalf of the Governing Board of the Aging and Disability Resource Center (ADRC) of Dane County, I am writing to alert you to a provision in the budget that will be harmful to ADRCs statewide, including Dane County, and the thousands of older people, people with disabilities, and their families that we serve each year. The Governor's budget proposal would eliminate ADRC Governing Boards, Long-term Care Advisory Councils, and would allow the state to contract with a private entity to provide some or all services presently provided by ADRCs. In other words, it would be possible to totally replace existing ADRCs, most of which are public agencies, with private companies.

The birth of ADRCs began in Wisconsin in the 1990s and has since spread to every state in the country. The ADRC of Dane County opened in November of 2012 and has provided almost 44,000 contacts with the community. The ADRC brings to the community a blend of public supports and community resources empowering customers to make informed choices regarding options available, taking into account a customers' private resources. The idea of "one stop shopping" to learn about all services that might be available to an older person and people with disabilities has resonated with ADRCs in every county in Wisconsin and every state in the U.S. In short, ADRCs have been a huge success story that had its beginnings in Wisconsin.

There are many other concerns in the Governor's budget beyond the ADRC proposals, including elimination of the IRIS (Include, Respect, I Self-Direct) program of self-directed care, and what appears to be a desire to turn Family Care and existing long-term care programs over to private insurance companies. Wisconsin's long-term care programs, including ADRCs, are not broken. Just the opposite is true; Wisconsin is among a few states that have successfully reformed its long-term care programs to reverse the institutional bias and to provide real consumer choices to frail older persons and people with disabilities. ADRCs are a major part of that reform and are a model for all other states.

Since ADRC's have been so successful based on a Wisconsin idea that is locally accountable, this proposal seems like a betrayal of that idea, and the intent of the program to assist local people to learn about local resources. In fact, we are at a loss to understand the reason and source of this change. We would appreciate your assistance in learning the reasons for it.



Connecting People With The Assistance They Need

We urge you to maintain ADRCs and related programs as they exist, instead of the Governor's proposals to "fix" them. We look forward to hearing back from you regarding our questions and concerns.


