# ROCK COUNTY LAND CONSERVATION COMMITTEE Wednesday December 2, 2020, 7:15 P.M. Virtual Meeting - Zoom

1. **Call to Order:** Chair Bostwick called the meeting to order at 7:15 pm.

**Committee Members Present:** Stephanie Aegerter, Rich Bostwick, Wes Davis, Kaelyb Lokrantz, Mike Mulligan, James Quade and Alan Sweeney

Committee Members Excused: None

Others Present: Andrew Baker, Bill Wilson (soon to be appointed Committee member)

Chair Bostwick welcomed soon to be appointed Supervisor and Committee member Bill Wilson, who joined the meeting as a guest. Mr. Wilson is replacing Jeremy Zajac, representing District 5 (City of Milton, Wards 1-8).

- 2. **Approval of Agenda:** Supervisor Davis moved to approve the agenda as written, seconded by Supervisor Aegerter. **Motion carried unanimously.**
- 3. **Approval of Minutes November 2, 2020 LCC meeting.** Mr. Quade moved the approval of the minutes, seconded by Supervisor Lokrantz. **Motion carried unanimously.**
- 4. **Citizen Participation, Communications, and Announcements:** Andrew noted that he gave a presentation at the Towns Association meeting (virtual) on November 19<sup>th</sup>. The presentation was also sent to the all Town Clerks via PDF. Supervisor Aegerter informed the Committee that the farmers market would be held at the former Janesville Mall on Saturday morning.
- 5. **Review Bills Paid:** The Committee reviewed the bills to be paid. There were no questions.
- 6. Land and Water Resource Management Program Approval of Cost Share Agreements: Andrew reviewed the Cost Share agreement to be considered for approval;
  - A. Hullah (various land owners)- Nutrient Management (approximately 500 acres)
  - B. Weberpal Farms LLC Grade Stabilization and Stream Bank

General discussion followed. Supervisor Sweeney made a motion to approve the cost share agreements presented for approval, seconded by Supervisor Mulligan. **Motion carried unanimously.** 

- 7. **Action Item:** Six month extension for EC-2019-024, Rock County Rifle and Pistol Club. Supervisor Davis and Mulligan had questions about possible lead in soil that was to be stabilized in the berms. Committee questioned the need for the six month extension. Andrew stated he would ask about the specific status, but primary purpose was to complete stabilization of the site. Supervisor Davis made a motion to approve the extension, seconded by Mr. Quade. **Motion carried unanimously.**
- 8. **Action Item: Creation of the Rock County Illicit Discharge Ordinance.** Andrew explained this item was postponed from November and gave a general summary. The creation of this Ordinance, applicable only for the Urbanized Area associated with the County WPDES MS4 permitted area, is a requirement of the WPDES municipal stormwater permit. Supervisors had questions about future enforcement of the Ordinance and how it applied to existing connections. Andrew referred to the proposed ordinance and explained how it would be implemented. Supervisor Aegerter made a motion to approve the Ordinance presented for approval, seconded by Supervisor Lokrantz. **Motion carried unanimously.**

- 9. Action Item: Approval of Intergovernmental Agreement Between Rock County and the City of Beloit Regarding Technical Services for Water Quality Trading. Andrew explained that the agreement is similar to agreement already in place with Yahara WINS. In this agreement, LCD staff provides all the technical services related to planning and installation of conservation practices, but not involved with the contract or payment to landowners. The City of Beloit enters into these agreements with landowners as a means to meet the TMDL Phoshorous limits associated with the waste water treatment facility. This is an alternative to making upgrades to the facility itself. The team of the agreement is 10 years. In that time, LCD staff will continue to monitor contracted areas on an annual basis. The City will compensate the LCD based on a percentage (15%) of each contract value. The estimate is around \$77,000, with payments made after the practice is installed. The Committee guestioned whether or not there is enough time for Staff to complete this extra work. Andrew noted that, yes it is another commitment, but the Department can make it work. Primary workload will be in year one when design and implementation is done. Chris Murphy is the lead person for the work, but other design and implementation tasks are completed by additional staff as well. There is not just one person working on the project. The City of Janesville has also showed interest in a similar agreement, which we are working on drafting.
- 10. Action Item. Purchase of Agricultural Conservation Easements: Review recommendations from PACE Council regarding 2020 applications and selection of applications to be sent to USDA-NRCS for consideration.

Supervisor Sweeney made a motion to approve the applications for NRCS consideration as recommended by the PACE Council, seconded by Supervisor Lokrantz.

Andrew reviewed the applications via Powerpoint Presentation, which was also reviewed by the PACE Council at the meeting on December 1st. The LCC reviewed the LESA scoring system utilized to determine the target acquisition areas based on various factors. Andrew also explained the NRCS ranking system for applications submitted statewide. The ranking is similar, some points are based on County related factors as a whole, so each application from Rock County will have the same score on those factors. There are nine parcels in the application pool this year, from six different landowners. The Vanthournout (two parcels) and Myre (one parcel) applications are renewals from prior years that were not selected. Vanthournount was recommended to NRCS for funding by the LCC last years, but the allocation at the federal level was no quite enough to cover it. The two parcels rank very high on both scoring systems. The LCC discuss the merits of the various parcels, but ultimately agrees with the PACE Council that the highest scoring parcels in priority areas should be considered first.

Andrew reviewed that the PACE Council recommended, in priority order, the Vanthournout applications, the southern Watson parcel (6-16-17.1) and the Conway parcel. The was some discussion regarding Watson as compared to Conway in terms of preference since the LESA score are very close. The LCC felt the Watson parcel has a slight preference because it is adjacent to another PACE easement, therefore will rank slightly higher on the federal score sheet. Also, the Conway parcel is very large (167 acres), which is a good thing, but may use up all funding for one application.

Chair Bostwick called for the vote. **Motion carried unanimously** to have staff send the applications to NRCS as recommended by the PACE Council.

11. **Adjourn:** Mr. Quade made motion to adjourn at 8:30 pm, seconded by Supervisor Mulligan. **Motion carried unanimously.**

# APPROVAL TO BEGIN ACQUISITION PROCESS FOR SELECTED 2020 PACE PROGRAM APPLICATIONS (FEDERAL FUNDING APPLICATIONS)

1 WHEREAS, the Rock County Board of Supervisors officially approved the Rock County Purchase of

- 2 Agricultural Conservation Easements (PACE) Program and adopted the document entitled Rock County PACE
- 3 Program Manual, identifying and outlining all aspects of Program development and implementation, on
- 4 January 13, 2011; and,

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WHEREAS, the Program works to achieve the mission by acquiring agricultural conservation easements (Easements) on eligible lands throughout unincorporated Rock County; and,

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9 **WHEREAS**, the Land Conservation Department (LCD) received four (4) new landowner applications and reactivated two (2) landowner applications for the PACE Program during the 2020 application cycle, totaling ten (10) parcels and approximately seven hundred (700) acres; and,

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WHEREAS, the applications have been reviewed by LCD staff, the PACE Council, and the Land Conservation Committee (LCC), all in accordance with the Rock County PACE Program Manual; and,

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WHEREAS, the LCC voted to approve the reactivation of the Vanthournout application and approved the new
 applications for the Conway and Watson parcels to begin the Easement acquisition process. The applications are
 described as:

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Vanthournout Properties – Rock County tax parcel number **6-20-107.2**, part of the SW ¼ of Section 13, Township 4N, Range 10E, Union Township (approximately 40 acres); and Rock County tax parcel number **6-20-109**, part of the SW ¼ of Section 13, Township 4N, Range 10E, Union Township (approximately 40 acres); and,

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Conway Property – Rock County tax parcel **6-10-117A**, part of the S ½ of Section 16, Township 2N, Range 13E, LaPrairie Township (approximately 167 acres); and,

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Watson Property – Rock County tax parcel **6-16-17.1**, part of SE1/4 of Section 2, Township 4N, Range 11E, Porter Township (approximately 40 acres); and,

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WHEREAS, to proceed with the Easement acquisition process, the LCD will submit an Easement acquisition funding application for the aforementioned properties to the USDA-Natural Resources Conservation Service ("NRCS"), which, if approved, provides funding for a maximum fifty percent of the Easement value; and,

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WHEREAS, the NRCS requires, as a component of its application process, a signed purchase agreement between Rock County and the owners of the aforementioned properties; and,

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WHEREAS, the agreement will be based on an estimated value of the Easement and is contingent on a final value being determined by an appraisal, which will be contracted by Rock County only if the property is selected by the NRCS for funding; and,

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WHEREAS, to formalize the Easement acquisition process, the owners of the aforementioned Properties, Rock
 County, and Brabazon Title Company, Inc. will sign and execute three *Agricultural Conservation Easement Conveyance Agreement* documents (i.e. purchase agreement), one for each application, which will include the
 estimated purchase price and will outline all aspects of the Easement acquisition process, including but not limited

to, the following activities, subject to all terms and conditions as stated therein:

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1. Opening an escrow with Brabazon Title Company, Inc. and securing a minimum Title Insurance Commitment of \$15,000 (Title Report) for each Property,

- 2. Landowner depositing three thousand five hundred dollars (\$3,500) in the established escrow account,
- 3. LCD submitting an application to the NRCS for the federal portion of the purchase funding,
- 4. If selected for funding by the NRCS, Rock County contracting with an appraiser to determine the fair market value of the Easement; and,

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WHEREAS, final acquisition of any or all of the Easements will take place only after future action by the County Board.

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NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, the Rock County Board of Supervisors duly assembled this day of \_\_\_\_\_\_, 2021, does by enactment of this Resolution approve an *Agricultural* 

60 Conservation Easement Conveyance Agreement for each property, authorizes the County Board Chair to sign all

# **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

# APPROVAL TO BEGIN ACQUISITION PROCESS FOR SELECTED 2020 PACE PROGRAM APPLICATIONS (FEDERAL FUNDING APPLICATIONS)

This resolution authorizes the County to enter into an Agricultural Conservation Easement Conveyance Agreement (four parcels located in unincorporated Rock County. The Agreement identifies and outlines the agricultural conservation easement (Easement) acquisition process to be undertaken by the Rock County PACE Program. The first steps in the process include establishing an escrow account to be held by Brabazon Title Company, purchasing title insurance, submitting applications to the USDA-NRCS funding of a portion of the easement value and contracting for is contingent upon funding from the USDA-NRCS and will be finalized only after future action by the County Board.
