# "Healthful Hint" Monthly Health News Column

## Celebrating with Fire Safety and Prevention in Mind

July usually means hot weather and that the peak of summer has finally hit. Families are in full swing; camping, cooking outdoors, attending family reunions, celebrating the Fourth of July and doing yard work. With all the festivities of building camp fires, roasting marshmallows, igniting fireworks, having cookouts and tending to yard work, fire becomes a real danger. Make sure children do not play with fire or use matches!

Teaching burn safety lessons can be a foreign concept to many children. Children are curious and love to explore. They do not understand or foresee the potential dangers of things that can be potentially hot and cause life threatening burns. Teach burn safety precautions to children as well as adults to prevent burn injuries.

Here's how:

#### **Fireworks**

- The U.S. Fire Administration recommends attending public fireworks displays and leaving the lighting to the professionals.
- Young children should never be allowed to play with or ignite fireworks. Many children suffer injuries from sparklers. Sparklers can burn at temperatures of about 2,000 degrees. This is hot enough to melt some metals!
- Around the July 4<sup>th</sup> holiday, 200 people on average go the emergency room every day with fireworks-related injuries.

## **Campfires**

- Do not allow children to play near campfires.
- Do not build a fire in dry and hazardous conditions.
- Find out if a campground has an existing fire pit or fire ring.
- If you do not use an existing fire pit and fire pits are allowed, look for a site that is at least 15 feet away from trees, shrubs, tent walls or flammable objects. Look overhead for low-hanging branches.
- Watch wind conditions.

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- Keep campfires small.
- Keep plenty of water and a shovel around to douse the fire when you're done. Stir it and douse it again with water.
- Never leave campfires unattended. Stay by the fire until it is completely out.

#### **Outdoor Grilling**

- Children need to be supervised around outdoor grills.
- Avoid wearing loose clothing while cooking over a grill.
- Dispose of hot coals correctly douse them with plenty of water, and stir them to ensure that the fire is out. Never place hot coals or ash in plastic, paper or wooden containers.
- Never grill/barbecue in enclosed areas as carbon monoxide could be produced and is deadly. Carbon monoxide is a poisonous, odorless, colorless and tasteless gas.
- Make sure everyone knows how to Stop, Drop and Roll in case a piece of clothing or hair catches on fire.

#### In the Home

- Never leave items cooking on the stove unattended.
- Turn pot handles in towards the rear of the stove.
- Keep hot liquids out of the reach of children and pets.
- Never cook while wearing loose clothing and tie long hair back.
- Keep space heaters away from combustible materials.
- Avoid smoking in the house and never smoke in bed.
- Unplug all irons, including clothes irons, hair curlers and flat irons.
- Set your water heater thermostat between  $120^{\circ}$  and  $130^{\circ}$  F (49 54 C) to prevent scalding.
- Block access to children around stoves and fireplaces.
- Place electrical covers over outlets to avoid electric burns. Keep cords away from children so they don't chew on them.
- Choose a cool-water humidifier or vaporizer.
- Make sure candles are put out in all rooms. Never leave candles unattended.
- Install several smoke detectors and carbon monoxide detectors in your home, test alarms monthly and change batteries regularly. Tip: Change batteries every time you change your clocks (in the spring and fall).

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Be sure to call 911 or your local emergency number if a burn requires serious medical attention. Educate children on fire safety and teach them to report any loose matches or lighters to an adult. Pay close attention to children to help avoid serious burns.
