Accepting State Targeted Response Opioid Crisis Grant Funds and Amending the 2017 Budget to Create .4 FTE RN Project Position and 1.0 FTE AODA Case Manager Project Position

WHEREAS, the Human Services Department requests that the County Board accept \$124,387 in funding from the State Targeted Response to the Opioid Crisis (STR) Grant and amend the 2017 budget accordingly; and,

WHEREAS, the grant provides funding for the Department to expand AODA treatment services to offer medication-assisted treatment, a best practice for opioid treatment; and,

WHEREAS, our community has a shortage of services available for opioid treatment, and this expansion represents an opportunity for the Department to meet a gap in care and reduce wait times for treatment; and,

WHEREAS, the grant enables the Department to expand on existing services and resources, including the AODA walk-in clinic, Rock County Counseling Center's behavioral health services, and AODA block grant funding; and,

WHEREAS, the availability of additional treatment in our community is critical to turning the tide of the opiate epidemic and, ultimately, reducing overdose deaths and the devastating effects on individuals and families in Rock County.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Rock County Board of Supervisors duly assembled this _/O+h day of __Cugust__, 2017 does hereby authorize the acceptance of State Targeted Response Opioid Crisis Grant funds to create .4 FTE RN Project Position and 1.0 AODA Case Manager Project Position.

Executive Summary

Rock County had 33 confirmed deaths due to opioid overdose in 2016, and is on track to exceed that number in 2017. While our community has some outpatient services available for treatment, and has taken steps to bridge gaps in care for uninsured individuals, there is still a shortage of evidence-based treatment for opioid dependence. The best standard of care for treating opioid dependence is a combination of self-help, behavioral therapies, and medications. Currently, individuals seeking medication-assisted treatment face wait times of 3-6 months to receive care, and have additional barriers due to lack of providers and rapid discharges for program violations.

With the State Targeted Response (STR) Grant Funds, Rock County Human Services will expand outpatient programming to provide greater access to medication-assisted treatment for individuals in our community. We will offer intensive outpatient AODA services in a comprehensive treatment program that combines monitoring, counseling, case management, and medications. The program will operate on foundational principles of removing barriers to accessing care, reducing wait times, and implementing best practices for treatment. We will use the existing structure of our AODA walk-in clinic to facilitate initial screening and admission and will also use existing facilities and staff through our Janesville Counseling Center to provide psychiatric care. To accommodate the monitoring and case management needs associated with medication-assisted treatment, Rock County Human Services will hire a part time nurse and a full time AODA therapist to provide for patient care and to support psychiatry staff in a multi-disciplinary team format. Throughout the project, Rock County will be receiving technical assistance from The Network for the Improvement of Addiction Treatment (NIATx) at UW Madison, as part of an ongoing project to expand medication-assisted treatment. Our hope is that this addition to our service array will offer greater access to treatment for individuals struggling with opioid addiction in Rock County. Our ultimate goals are to reduce overdose deaths, to help individuals reduce drug use and remain engaged in treatment, to enhance public safety, and to improve quality of life for individuals and families in our community.

In addition to salaries and benefits, the STR funds will purchase drug testing, drug treatment, computers and phones. Rock County Human Services intends to apply for a subsequent STR Grant in 2018. Should Rock County not be funded, the Project Positions would be eliminated in April 2018.
